A letter was received from Mr. A. L. Rush, the Secretary to the Freeholders, Manor of Rusthall, stating that at a meeting of the Committee of the Freehold Tenants held on the 5th instant, Mr. William Taylor, of "Windybraes," Speldhurst, was elected to represent them on the Tunbridge Wells Commons Conservators.

Minutes.—The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Trees, St. Helena.—The Clerk reported the correspondence which he had received from the Secretary to the Freeholders, Manor of Rusthall, with reference to certain trees which had been planted on the Common on the south-east side of "St. Helena," and stating that the Committee of the Freehold Tenants are of opinion that the matter is one to be dealt with by the Commons Conservators and did not come under their jurisdiction.

RESOLVED—That the letter be referred to the Committee.

- Committee's Report.—The Committee held a meeting on the 19th November, 1921, at which meeting the following were present:—Messrs. C. Berry, T. Edwards, Hallett Reed, and Brig.-Gen. Suart, c.m.g., and report as follows:—
 - (1) The Committee inspected the trees in front of No. 24, Eridge Road, and recommend that no action be taken in the matter.
 - (a) RESOLVED—That this recommendation be adopted.
 - (2) Provision of a sheltered seat—Happy Valley.—The Committee considered the question of the provision of a sheltered seat at the Happy Valley and recommend that no action be taken in the matter.
 - (b) RESOLVED—That this recommendation be adopted.
- Appointment of Committee.—Resolved—That Mr. C. Berry, Mr. T. Edwards, Mr. Hallett Reed, Brig.-Gen. Suart, c.m.c., and Mr. H. J. Willmot be appointed a Committee until the 9th day of November next.
- Trees.—A letter was received from Brig.-Gen. W. H. Suart, C.M.G., enclosing a letter from Messrs. Arthur Charlton & Sons, with a specification and estimate for supplying and planting trees on Rusthall Common near the entrance to the High Street, Rusthall.
 - (a) Resolved—That the letter be referred to the Committee.
 - It was reported to the Committee that Brig.-Gen. Suart, c.m.c., had also raised the question of planting Scotch firs on the Common above the Sanitary Convenience near the Upper Cricket Ground.
 - (b) Resolved—That the matter be referred to the Committee.

- Footpaths.—Brig.-Gen. Suart, C.M.G., also raised the question of making up and eventually asphalting the path leading from the Spa Hotel by the sheltered seat to the Upper Cricket Ground.

- Gorse Cutting.—The Surveyor reported on the work of gorse cutting on the Commons and the expenditure on this account to date.
 - RESOLVED—That a further sum of £50 be expended on gorse cutting.
- Scenic Railway, etc., on Common.—Questions relating to a scenic railway, etc., remaining on the Common on a Sunday were deferred to the next meeting of the Conservators.
- Pond, Langton Road.—Resolved—That questions relating to the cleansing of the pond near the Langton Road end of Rusthall Common be referred to the Committee.
- Accounts—Year ended 25th March, 1921.—The Auditor's report on the accounts for the year ended the 25th March, 1921, was received and considered.
 - (a) RESOLVED—That a vote of thanks be given to Mr. S. A. Cheale for his services as Auditor.
 - (b) RESOLVED—That Messrs. S. A. Cheale and H. Elwig be appointed Auditors for the current year.
- Financial Statement.—The Clerk laid before the Conservators a statement of the estimated income and expenditure of the Conservators for the year ending 25th March, 1922.
- Estimates.—Resolved—That the Finance Committee of the Corporation be requested to include the sum of £597 in their estimates for the next financial year, for the purposes of the Commons Conservators.
- Accounts for Payment.—Accounts amounting to £144 14s. 4d. (as per list signed by the Chairman) were passed.

Work for Unemployed.—The following resolution of the Unemployment Committee of the Town Council was considered:—

"That, subject to the consent of the Commons Conservators (and that the Commons Conservators be asked to give such consent at as early a date as possible in view of the prevailing distress), unemployed men in the Borough be engaged in re-surfacing the gravel paths and other works on the Commons, two gangs of men to be engaged for two days each gang (eight-and-a-half hours per day), the wages to be at the rate of 1s. per hour for such work, provided that unemployed men in the Borough not in receipt of Unemployment pay are to be engaged on the same terms for four days, instead of two days."

The Committee reported that at their meeting this morning they considered questions relating to work for unemployed, and they recommend the Conservators to provide work by making up foot-paths on the Commons, and, subject to the Unemployment Committee of the Town Council providing the necessary labour, to supply the materials for such work.

- (a) RESOLVED—That the Conservators consent to the repairing of foot-paths on the Common, and authorise the Surveyor to supply the necessary materials for the work, subject to the labour being provided by the Unemployment Committee of the Town Council.
- (b) Resolved—That the footpath leading from the Spa Hotel to the Upper Cricket Ground and thence to the Post Office be repaired under the scheme of work for unemployed.
- War Memorial, Rusthall.—An application was received from the Vicar of Rusthall for permission to erect a War Memorial, standing partly on the Common and partly on Rusthall Churchyard.
 - A plan shewing the design of the proposed Memorial was laid before the Committee.
 - The Committee reported that they had inspected the site of the proposed Memorial, and recommended that no objection be offered to the proposal.

RESOLVED—That the Vicar of Rusthall be informed that the Commons Conservators offer no objection to the proposal if carried out in accordance with the design submitted.

Trees.—The Committee reported that they had considered the question of planting trees on Rusthall Common near the entrance to the High Street, Rusthall, and recommended that the scheme submitted by Messrs. Charlton & Son be not adopted, but that the Conservators do instruct the Surveyor to plant three clumps of gorse and trees on Rusthall Common, near the entrance to Rusthall High Street, at a cost not exceeding £25.

RESOLVED—That the recommendation of the Committee be adopted.

WORK FOR UNEMPLOYED.

Dear Sir,—I read to the Guardians yesterday your letter of the 22nd inst., which enclosed copy of a letter of the 15th inst., from the Tradesmen's

Association, on the subject of finding work for the unemployed on the

Tunbridge Wells Common.

The Guardians recently had a somewhat similar application from the Tonbridge Urban District Council asking them to make a grant to be spent in wages to those of the unemployed who would otherwise have to be supported by Poor Relief, and the Guardians decided, subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health, to contribute, by way of wages towards the unemployment of as many men as possible by the Urban District Council; each family being relieved according to necessity, and the payment by the Guardians to be at the rate of 1s. per hour. I send you copy of the reply of the Ministry of Health of the 18th inst., stating that they will be prepared to sanction contributions by the Guardians towards the works at Tonbridge, provided that the contribution covering the given period does not exceed the amount of Relief estimated to have been saved to the Guardians' fund during that period by the prosecution of the work.

The Guardians at their meeting yesterday decided to instruct their Relieving Officer to send to the Conservators a certain number of men to be employed on the works mentioned in the Tradesmen's Association letter, and to repay to the Conservators in lump sums the wages paid to the men at the rate of 1s. per hour. The Relieving Officer will, as in the case of the work at Tonbridge, select those men suitable for the work, whose circumstances appear to render them most in need of the assistance. I would suggest that the Conservators Surveyor, or other officer, should place himself in communication with Mr. H. C. Gilliam, the Relieving Officer, as to the number of men to be employed, It is intended that each man should have two days work per week.

If you will be good enough to keep an account of the wages on this special work vouched by time sheets, I will obtain a cheque on account

from the Guardians from time to time.

- Removable Lodge.—An application was received from the Linden Park Cricket Club for consent to the erection of a removable lodge on the Upper Cricket Ground to be used as a cricket pavilion.
 - Mr. G. Morris and Mr. B. Spencer (representing the Linden Park Cricket Club) attended the meeting to explain the proposals of the Club, and stated that the Club will be responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the pavilion in question.
 - 1. That the Conservators hereby consent to the erection on the Upper Cricket Ground forming part of the Commons, on a site to be approved by the

Conservators, of a removable lodge for purposes ancillary to the recreation of the public, *i.e.*, cricket and other games, such lodge to be constructed in accordance with the plan lodged with the Conservators and signed by their Clerk.

2. This consent is given on the express condition that such lodge be removable by the Conservators at any time without notice.

It was moved as an Amendment by Mr. C. Berry, seconded by Mr. S. V. Thorpe—subject to the substitution of the words "offer no objection" for the word "consent" in the first paragraph of the motion, and to the substitution of the word "approval" for the word "consent" in the second paragraph of the motion.

Rusthall Cricket Ground.—An application was received from the Hon. Secretary of the Rusthall Cricket Ground for permission temporarily to fence off an approximate area of 30 yards square in the centre of the cricket ground on Rusthall Common for the protection of the turf.

RESOLVED—That the Conservators do sanction the enclosure of the cricket pitch on Rusthall Common by a temporary fence during the present winter, such fence to be removed on receipt of notice by the Conservators so to do.

Dear Sir,-

APPROACH TO RUSTHALL CHURCHYARD.

I shall be obliged if you will bring the following matters before the notice of the Commons Conservators. I have already pointed them out to the Highways Inspector.

- 1. It would help to keep people from driving their cars right on to the Common overlooking the Happy Valley if 2 or 3 upright posts could be fixed immediately beyond the stone pitching, so that no vehicle could then go beyond the entrance to the School gates.
- 2. There is a big flow of water from the Common which overflows the gulley by the entrance to the Churchyard in rainy weather. I asked the Inspector whether the Commons men could not keep this drainpipe clear, so that the water could run away freely; also whether some of the water could not be diverted on the surface.
- 3. The ground round the War Memorial gets into a very muddy state when there is any rain. It would be a great convenience to all who visit the Memorial, and an improvement to the appearance of the Common, if some stone chippings could be thrown over this part, similar to the materials used for the paths on the Common.
- 4. We wish to ask for the sanction of the Conservators for the removal of the tree near the War Memorial, and for replanting it to fill a gap in the avenue. It is very much in the way where it now stands, and will presently discolour the Memorial.
- 5. We wish to ask whether the Commons men cannot sweep the road leading to the Church when they sweep the adjoining footpath, and whether the rain water which gathers on the road cannot be diverted. This road is now much more used by the ordinary public than by people going to the Church, so that it has virtually become a public road, both for people on foot and for bicycles and cars. As such, we think it ought to receive some attention.
- 6. We should be obliged if the trees could be cut back along the road, and the lower branches removed to prevent boys from climbing.

The dimensions of the board would be about 4ft. long by 2ft. wide, and the wording something in the nature of the following:—

Visitors are welcomed between the hours of 11 a.m. and 6 p.m.

The object of the board is, of course, to bring this very deserving and, at present, little known Home to the notice of the public and visitors to the Town, and, by howing them the good it is doing, to obtain their interest and support, of which it stands at present so badly in need.

A separate board would be most desirable, but even should your committee approve of this, I believe the sanction of the Lord of the Manor must be obtained.

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Failing this, could your Committee grant permission for use to bemade of the existing direction post? Naturally, we should expect to pay a small rent for the privilege.

I may say that I have not yet brought this matter before my own Committee, but I do not doubt their concurrence. The discovery that your Quarterly Meeting was fixed for Tuesday next left me no time.

I trust your Committee will endeavour to help me in this matter, as I feel it must make an appreciable difference to the Home, which is not a private one, but a part of a great national organisation on behalf of Child Welfare.

These would seem especially desirable near the Shelters—and perhaps a small notice calling attention to them might be placed in the

Shelters.

We would also like to suggest that when clearing the gorse it should be part of the duty of the Contractor to remove the very unsightly collection of tins, bottles and other debris which are now left as an eyesore to every passer-by.

Dear Sirs,

Lowering of Common at Junction of Major Yorke's Road and Hungershall Park Road.

With reference to the recent applications which you have received with regard to this matter, I have, as you are aware, always objected to the proposal as I do not think that the Commons should be mutilated for the benefit of motorists. The plea is that this corner is a danger to the public, but the danger arises from the motorist and not from the corner, as is obvious when you consider that no such danger existed when horse drawn vehicles were used. Is there any greater danger at this corner than at the corner of any public street? If not, what is there to complain of, seeing that in each case accidents can be avoided by using ordinary care. The lowering of the bank would simply enable motorists to drive at a faster rate than in the circumstances is safe for the public.

I think it is scandalous the way in which motorists are permitted to monopolise the roads to the practical exclusion of the public. In Brighton there are some roads which cannot be crossed except at the risk of one's life, and apparently matters are just as bad at Tunbridge Wells; for only a short time ago, my permission was asked to fix an Ambulance Emergency Box on the Common near the junction of London Road and Nevill Street, owing to the number of serious

accidents in that locality. Think what the condition of the roads must be when

it is necessary to keep surgical dressings in constant readiness.

As the present is one of the many questions which are constantly cropping up in relation to the Commons between the Corporation and myself surely the time has arrived when they should seriously consider the advisability of acquiring the Commons for the Town. This acquisition was clearly contemplated at the time of the passing of the 1890 Act as express power is thereby conferred upon the Corporation to purchase the Commons, for which purpose the increase entailed in the rates would be merely the fraction of a penny for a few years.

Ashley Gardens.—A letter was received from the Town Clerk of Tunbridge Wells intimating that the Town Council have had under consideration the question of making up Ashley Gardens, which runs from Meadow Road to a point in Lower Green Road, Rusthall, near the Red Lion Inn, under the Private Street Works Act, 1892, and that as it would appear the northern portion of this street near its junction with Lower Green Road crosses a detached part of the Rusthall Common, coloured blue on the deposited map, he was instructed to ask for the consent of the Conservators, so far as such consent may be necessary, to the Town Council's proposals.

RESOLVED—That, subject to the settlement of questions pending between the Lord of the Manor and the Corporation as to the exact course of the road in question and to the submission to the Conservators of a plan shewing the line of the road which may be agreed between the parties interested, the Clerk be authorised to sign a consent to the Town Council's proposals under the provisions of section 168 of the Tunbridge Wells Improvement Act, 1890.

Trees.—A letter was received from Mrs. Black calling attention to the destruction of trees by youths on the Common in front of her house and to the annoyance to which she has been subjected by such youths.

RESOLVED—That the letter be referred to the Chief Constable and that instructions be given to the Commons Rangers to do all they can to prevent a recurrence of what Mrs. Black complains.

Seats.—The question of the provision of a seat on the fringe of the Common on Mount Ephraim near "St. Helena" was again considered.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred back to the Committee for further report.

- Questions relating to seats on Rusthall Common were considered and Mr. Hallett Reed intimated that he would furnish the Surveyor with a list of those seats which require attention.
- Committee's Report.—The Committee submitted the following Report of their proceedings at a meeting held on the 2nd instant.
 - TUNBRIDGE WELLS COMMONS.—The following Report on the Tunbridge Wells Commons adopted at a meeting of the Committee of the Royal Tunbridge Wells Chamber of Trade on the 4th November, 1930, referred by the Commons Conservators to their Committee, was considered by such Committee at a meeting held on March 2nd, 1931.

REPORT ON THE CONDITION OF THE TUNBRIDGE WELLS COMMONS.

Adopted by the Royal Tunbridge Wells Chamber of Trade Committee— 4th November, 1930.

1. Two notice boards by "Belle Vue" need removing as the path referred to—Mount Ephraim to London Road—is not private as suggested, but is a public right of way.

- 2. The corner at the junction of Church Road and Mount Ephraim (on the right hand side going up Church Road) is dangerous, the channel being unnecessarily deep and the slope begins too far in the promenade.
- 3. Some of the roads and paths from the Common to the Mount Ephraim Promenade cutting through the promenade, need to be brought to the level when crossing the promenade. As it is at present it is very awkward for invalids in bath chairs and others.
- 4. Many of the footpaths on the Common are made up with wrong material, being covered with loose and sharp stones, making it impossible to walk on them, viz.:—(1) From Church Road via Lower Cricket Ground across Hungershall Park—very bad in places. (2) From the Upper Cricket Ground through the Queen's Grove towards London Road and the other way to the Spa Hotel; and others. The footpath on the left from the Spa Hotel to Rusthall needs attention.
- 5. The trees and furze damaged by fire need attention—the dead wood to be cut out and the dead trees removed (this is now in hand).

The instruction of the Conservators that the bracken and furze should be cut back at least six yards round the trees is not being carried out—it should be, being a great protection to the trees from fire. It is suggested that the area of the furze needs dividing into smaller patches to prevent fire spreading over such a large area.

Some of the birch trees need thinning out, too many are growing up—a specially bad place is between Hungershall Park and the junction of the Race Course with Hungershall Park Road on the left side, and some yards down the Race Course.

- 6. Suitable trees should be replanted to replace some of the ten taken or blown down, but 100 feet back from the road; others might be planted near the edge of the Common above London Road, commencing opposite the General Post Office, and planted 100 feet back and about 200 feet apart and extending to the Pump Room.
- 7. The "cultivated" corner in Bishops Down needs watching, that nothing more is done there by way of cultivation, and the public not prevented from walking thereon.
- 8. Notices as to the destruction of trees and flowers should be kept posted up—the heather and ling specially need protecting, these have steadily decreased each year for some years past.
- 9. The seats on the Commons should be kept in better repair. Two collapsed near the Race Course in August—when most needed—and others require attention.
- 10. The Rangers should be more in evidence and some at least be in uniform, or wear a cap that they feel can be identified.
- 11. Motorists need direction as to where they may take their cars—specially on Sundays—the Race Course has been obstructed by them.
- 12. The Fir Tree Pond needs cleaning out and the Scotch fire trees which were at the top of the Hill above it need replacing. The dead trees on the slope need removing.

RESOLVED—That the following Report (dealing with each paragraph of the Report received from the Chamber of Trade) be submitted to the Commons Conservators at their meeting to be held on the 3rd March instant.

Paragraph 1.

The question of the two notice boards by "Belle Vue" is under the consideration of the Conservators.

Paragraph 2.

The matter referred to in this paragraph is one to be dealt with by the Works Committee of the Town Council—a copy of the paragraph has been placed before that Committee.

Paragraph 3.

Any alteration to the levels of the roads and footpaths would be impracticable. If practicable, it would be inadvisable.

Paragraph 4.

The footpaths are gradually receiving attention with the object of rendering them as convenient for foot-passengers as possible.

Paragraph 5.

The trees and furze damaged by fire have been attended to. All the other matters referred to are receiving the attention of the Conservators.

Paragraph 6.

Attention is given to the planting of trees as funds permit. The trees which were blown down or removed for public safety have been replaced by others.

Paragraphs 7.

The matter referred to in this paragraph receives constant attention.

Paragraph 8.

Notices are periodically exhibited upon the Commons and renewed when destroyed or damaged.

Paragraph 9.

Repairs to seats are systematically carried out. The seats to which this paragraph refers were wilfully broken and were removed to prevent injury to any person who might sit on them unaware of their condition.

Paragraph 10.

The Committee recommend that official caps be provided for the Conservators employees on the Commons.

Paragraph 11.

The Police call the attention of motorists to the parking places prescribed by the Corporation as the local authority.

Paragraph 12.

This matter is under the consideration of the Commons Conservators.

The Committee think the attention of the Chamber of Trade should be called to the fact that the Conservators' funds available for the maintenance and improvement of the Commons are limited by statute to a half-yearly sum equivalent to a rate of a farthing in the pound calculated upon the rateable value of the Borough. For the last three years their expenditure has been as follows:—

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Committee, with power to act, and that, in the meantime, the Clerk be instructed to enquire of Messers. Stone, Simpson & Hanson whether their Client would be prepared to bear the expense of the removal of the seat should it be decided that this could be done.

Trees.—A letter was received from the Hon. Secretary of the Royal Tunbridge Wells Chamber of Trade enclosing (at the request of Mr. C. E. Hillman) a copy of the list of those who planted the three rows of trees (elm, lime and sycamore) in the Royal Victoria Grove on the Common in February, 1835, intimating that it was recently suggested that members of the Chamber of Trade should similarly offer to plant trees on the Common in positions selected by the Commons Conservators to replace others which had been blown down and that at the present time he had offers of 20 trees and could no doubt obtain a larger number if the idea met with the approval of the Commons Conservators.

"That the Surveyor be instructed to communicate with the builder concerned and point out to him that the user of the footway leading from
Langton Road to 'Rusthall Elms' for the purposes of carting building
materials must be discontinued."

RESOLVED—That the Committee's resolution be confirmed.

Riding on Commons.—Questions relating to riding on the Commons contrary to the terms of Bye-Law No. 31 were again considered.

The Surveyor submitted a plan showing a suggested area over which the Conservators might consider the desirability of making an Order prohibiting riding.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Committee for consideration and report.

- Committee's Report.—The Committee submitted the following Report of their proceedings at a meeting held on the 27th ultimo:—
 - (1) Trees.—The Committee inspected various trees on the Common.
 - 1. Resolved—That the Commons Conservators be recommended:—
 - (a) to instruct the Surveyor to remove a portion of a tree adjoining "Belleville" which is considered to be dangerous.
 - (b) to instruct the Surveyor to trim a tree adjoining "Belleville"
 - (c) to instruct the Surveyor lightly to trim some branches of an elm tree adjoining "St. Helena"

- (d) to instruct the Surveyor either (1) subject to the consent of the Lord of the Manor to remove a chestnut tree adjoining "St. Helena" or (2) to trim the limbs of the tree in question which overhang the "St. Helena" property
- (e) to instruct the Surveyor to trim the outer branches of four lime trees on the Common in front of Montacute Gardens.
- 2. Resolved—That the Surveyor be instructed forthwith to remove the two dead chestnut trees near "Fonthill," The Common, and to plant two oak trees in their place.
- (2) Tree Guards.—The Committee inspected the condition of a tree guard around a tree on the Common adjoining the footpath leading from The Pantiles to Vale Royal.

RESOLVED—That no action be taken in the matter.

(3) Driving on Common.—The Committee considered a letter from Miss Foot requesting that a licence might be granted to her to drive her car over the cobbled stone way on the Common in front of "Rockview," 78, London Road.

RESOLVED—That the Commons Conservators be recommended to inform Miss Foot that they are unable to give their consent to her proposal and to suggest that she should make provision for an entrance in the side wall of her premises which would give access to Dudley Road.

(4) Seats.—The Committee considered the setting back of the two seats at the bottom of the Common opposite King Charles' Church near the omnibus stop.

RESOLVED—That the Commons Conservators be recommended to set back, by 10 inches, the two seats in question, subject to the consideration of a Report by the Surveyor as to the work which would be required and an estimate of the cost thereof.

RESOLVED-

- (1) That the recommendations contained in the Committee's Report be adopted and acted upon with the exception of Recommendation 1 (d) and Recommendation (4).
- (2) That inasmuch as Recommendation (4) would involve an interference with the soil of the Commons an application be made to the Lord of the Manor for his consent to the execution of the necessary works and that if such consent be obtained Recommendation (4) of the Committee's Report be adopted and acted upon.
- It was reported to the Conservators that the adoption of the Recommendation under resolution (1) 2 would comply with the terms of the minute passed by the Conservators at their meeting on the 4th June, 1935, as to the planting of two oak trees on the Common near "Fonthill."
- Trees.—A letter was received from Mr. F. B. Jackson with regard to two trees near "St. Helena" on the Common.
 - It was reported to the Conservators that the matter to which Mr. Jackson referred was dealt with in the Committee's Report.
- Damage to Edges of Common.—The Surveyor reported to the Conservators on the damage caused by vehicular traffic to the edge of the Common at the junction of Tea Garden Lane and Langton Road.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to erect three posts on the edge of the Common at this junction to protect it from damage by vehicular traffic.

Questions relating to trespass by vehicular traffic at corner edges on various other parts of the Common were considered and referred to the Committee, with power to act.

Mount Ephraim Promenade.—The Surveyor reported on the present condition of the surface of Mount Ephraim Promenade.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to tar paint the surface of the Mount Ephraim Promenade.

- Sheltered Seats.—The Surveyor reported that he had received a request from Mr. S. H. Dowsett for the provision of an additional sheltered seat on the Common opposite Mount Ephraim House.
 - (a) Resolved—That Mr. S. H. Dowsett be informed that, in view of the expense which would be incurred, the Conservators are not at the present time prepared to comply with his request.
 - (b) RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to carry out necessary repairs to the existing sheltered seats on the Common.
 - The question of substituting wood panels for the existing glass panels in sheltered seats was considered.
 - (c) RESOLVED—That the glass panels be retained.
- Accounts—Year ended 25th March, 1935.—The Auditors' Report on the Accounts for the year ended 25th March, 1935, was received and considered.
 - (a) RESOLVED—That the Accounts for the year ended 25th March, 1935, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted.
 - (b) RESOLVED—That a hearty vote of thanks be given to Mr. H. Elwig and Lt.-Col. A. R. Cheale for their services as Auditors and that they be re-appointed Auditors for the current year.
- Vacancy on Committee.—It was reported to the Conservators that Mr. Alderman Dennis desired to resign his appointment as a Member of the Committee of the Conservators.
 - (a) RESOLVED—That Mr. Alderman Allan be appointed a Member of the Committee in his place.
 - It was also reported to the Conservators that Mr. Alderman Silcock had resigned as a Member of the Town Council and ceased to be a Conservator.
 - (b) Resolved—That the question of filling the additional vacancy on the Committee be deferred to the next meeting of the Conservators.
- Accounts for Payment.—Accounts amounting to £241 5s. 1d. (as per list signed by the Chairman) were passed.

Commons Conserbators.

7th July, 1936.—At a meeting of the Commons Conservators held at the Town Hall.

PRESENT—Messrs. L. Andrews, C. Berry, H. Elwig, W. Maynard, N. R. Stone and S. V. Thorpe.

Chairman.—RESOLVED—That Mr. Henry Elwig be appointed Chairman for this meeting.

Appointment of Conservator.—A letter was received from the Town Clerk of Tunbridge Wells intimating that the Town Council at its meeting held on the 1st April, 1936, appointed, until the 9th day of November, 1936, Mr. Councillor Draper as a Conservator of the Commons in the place of Mr. J. G. Silcock resigned.

Minutes.—The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Footpaths.—A letter was received from Miss E. A. Cumming with regard to the footpath leading from The Pantiles to the High Rocks Lane.

Seats.—A letter was received from Messrs. Berry & Berry intimating that they had been instructed by the Lord of the Manor to inform the Conservators that he consented to the work proposed in connection with the setting back of the two seats at the bottom of the Common opposite King Charles' Church near the bus stop.

Wild Birds.—A letter was received from Miss Ethel G. Woodd with regard to the protection of wild birds and their nests on the Commons and suggesting that the clearing and burning of gorse and undergrowth should be completed before the end of February.

A letter was received from the Local Secretary of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals requesting permission to erect notices in suitable places on the Commons warning persons against the robbing or destruction of birds, nests, and eggs.

RESOLVED—That the writer be informed that as a bye-law dealing with this matter is posted on notice boards in various parts of the Common the Conservators are unable to see their way to accede to the request.

- Driving on Common.—A letter was received from Miss Foot expressing regret that the Commons Conservators were unable to give their consent to her car being driven on the public cobble stones, which she had always taken to be a continuance of the public road up to her gate and she was not prepared to consider the suggestion of an entrance from her premises into Dudley Road.
- Damage, etc., on Common.—A letter was received from Mr. George Wilson complaining of the conduct of youths on the Common, whose attention had been called to damage done by them to broom growing on the Common.

The Clerk reported that a copy of the letter had been sent to the Chief Constable.

A letter was received from Messrs. E. J. Carter Banks & Bennett transmitting copy of a letter which they had sent to the Lord of the Manor in which it was stated that the Commons Ranger had reported that builders employed on the Dornden Estate (Messrs. Durrant of Uckfield) had pointed the brickwork of the boundary walls and in doing so several small trees on the Common had been cut down and bushes burnt to enable the employees to accomplish their work, that the Commons Ranger had remonstrated with them and they had replied they were entitled to cut away 3 feet from the wall if it obstructed their work, that they had been instructed by the Lord of the Mayor to communicate with the Conservators in order that the Conservators might take such action as might be considered necessary as, in the opinion of the Lord of the Manor, the matter complained of constituted an infringement of the bye-laws.

A Report was received from the Surveyor on the matter.

RESOLVED—That the Clerk be instructed to furnish Messrs. Durrant with a copy of the letter sent by Messrs. E. J. Carter Banks & Bennett to the Lord of the Manor, to call their attention to the Bye-Law No. 10, to point out the inaccuracy of their contention with regard to the three feet clearance from the wall and to request that they would give an undertaking not to repeat the unlawful acts which they appear to have committed on the Common.

- Footway leading to "Rusthall Elms."—A letter was received from Messrs. Durrant Bros. intimating that they had not used the footway leading from Langton Road to "Rusthall Elms" for the purposes of carting building materials since the receipt of the instructions received by them from the Surveyor to the Commons Conservators last year.
- Ponds.—A letter was received from Mrs. L. Evelyn Leeder with regard to the pond on the Common near the back entrance of "Rust Hall," complaining of mosquitoes and suggesting that the water in the pond should be treated with paraffin.
 - (a) RESOLVED—That the letter be referred to the Committee for consideration.
 - A letter was received from Mrs. L. M. Jones with regard to pools of water in Bulls Hollow which were alleged to be breeding grounds for various poisonous insects and which, although spread with potash, etc., continued to be a danger and requesting that the pools might be sprayed.
 - (b) RESOLVED—That the letter be referred to the Committee for consideration.
- Roadways on Common.—A letter was received from Messrs. Snell & Co. (on behalf of their Clients, Mr. and Mrs. Dan) intimating that they had received the approval of the Town Planning Committee to the erection of a garage at St. Helena, The Common, which would involve the construction of an approach drive over a small portion of the Common from Mt. Ephraim and applying for the consent of the Conservators to the construction of the drive in question.
 - Mr. Berry reported that the approval of the Lord of the Manor had been given to the construction of the roadway and contended that the approval of the Commons Conservators was not necessary.
 - The Clerk advised the Conservators that, in his view the Conservators had full power to refuse the application if they thought fit to do so.
 - No resolution was passed in response to Messrs. Snell & Co.'s application.
- Damage to Fence.—A letter was received from the Head Postmaster transmitting cheque for £3 3s. 1d., the cost of making good the damage to a fence on Mount Ephraim caused by one of the Departmental vans on the 24th April last.
- Drilling on Common.—An application was received from the Skinners' School O.T.C. for permission to exercise on the Common on June 15th, 22nd and 29th last.
 - The Clerk reported that the application had been granted and his action was approved.
- Vacancy on Committee.—Resolved—That Mr. Councillor Draper be appointed a Member of the Committee in the place of Mr. J. G. Silcock resigned.
- Grass Cutting.—Mr. S. V. Thorpe reported to the Conservators that an application had been received from the Tunbridge Wells and South Eastern Counties Agricultural Society for permission to cut the grass on the Common adjoining Eridge Road on the site used for a car park in connection with the Annual Show.

RESOLVED—That the Conservators offer no objection to the cutting of the grass by the Society on the site in question.

Accounts for Payment.—Accounts amounting to £191 11s. 10d. (as per list signed by the Chairman) were passed.

Minutes.—The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Trees on Common near boundary of Montacute Gardens, Eridge Road.—A letter was received from Mr. Bertram S. Beale with regard to the trimming of four lime trees near the boundary of Montacute Gardens, Eridge Road.

The Clerk's reply thereto was read and approved.

A letter was received from Mr. J. E. Pownall requesting that the large sycamore tree, the branches of which overhang "Romanoff Lodge," The Common, might be lopped as the tenant complained that the drippings from this tree make the room on that side of the house damp.

The Surveyor reported that he had trimmed back an overhanging branch and his action was approved.

Roadways on Common.—The letter from Messrs. Snell & Co. enquiring whether the proposed approach across the Common to "St. Helena" was approved by the Conservators and the Clerk's reply thereto transmitting an extract from the minutes of the proceedings of the Conservators at their meeting held on the 7th July last were considered.

RESOLVED-

- (a) That the Conservators do consent to the proposal on the understanding that the fencing on either side of the proposed approach be made good to the satisfaction of the Surveyor to the Conservators.
- (b) That the attention of the Works Committee of the Corporation be called to the need for the provision of a properly constructed crossing over the public pavement at the approach in question.
- Tunbridge Wells Improvement Act, 1890, and Commons Conservators Bye-Laws.—RESOLVED
 —That the Clerk be instructed to have such portions of the Tunbridge Wells
 Improvement Act, 1890, as relate to the Commons and also a copy of the
 Bye-Laws made by the Commons Conservators printed in booklet form and to
 furnish each Conservator with a copy.
- Damage, etc., on Common.—A letter was received from Messrs. Durrant Bros. intimating that from enquiries they had made with regard to the work carried out by them at "Dornden" they had ascertained that certain small growth on the Common was cut away to enable their work to be carried out, that they regretted the damage which might have been caused and would see that it was not repeated at any future time.
- Sewers under portion of the Common.—A letter was received from the Town Clerk, Tunbridge Wells, transmitting copy of a notice which had been served on the Lord of the Manor with reference to the laying of a sewer through a portion of the Tunbridge Wells Common.
 - The Clerk reported the letter which he had circulated to the Members of the Committee of the Conservators on the subject and the replies which he had received thereto.
- Telephones.—A letter was received from the Sectional Engineer of the Post Office Engineering Department intimating that in connection with the extension of the Department's telephonic service at Tunbridge Wells it was necessary to lay an underground telephone line as shown on the blue prints which accompanied their letter, asking for the consent of the Commons Conservators and enclosing the Department's usual consent forms for that purpose.

RESOLVED—That the Commons Conservators do consent to the proposed works, that the Clerk be authorised to sign the consent forms and that the attention of the Department be called to the fact that it should also obtain the consent of the Lord of the Manor and Freehold Tenants.

- Pedestrian Crossing, Langton Road.—A letter was received from the Borough Surveyor intimating that he had obtained from the Lord of the Manor permission to erect a pedestrian crossing in Langton Road adjoining the footpath leading from Rusthall Church and Boys' School across Rusthall Common, the beacons being erected on the Common, and applying for the consent of the Commons Conservators thereto.
 - The Clerk reported that he had communicated with each Commons Conservator and none of them having dissented from the application being granted, he had accordingly informed the Borough Surveyor that consent was given to the proposal and his action was approved.
- Surveyor of Commons.—A letter was received from the Ordnance Survey Office intimating that the revision of the Ordnance Survey was now in progress in this part of the County of Kent and requesting that such facilities as might be required to carry on the work, without unnecessary delay and with as little annoyance as possible, might be extended to their Surveyors.

 - (a) Resolved—That the Committee be authorised (if they think fit) to sanction on behalf of the Conservators such extension of the ground as they may consider desirable.
 - (b) Resolved—That the consideration of the question of the erection of a pavilion be deferred and that the Surveyor be instructed to obtain from the Rusthall Cricket Club a plan of the proposed pavilion, with particulars of its design, materials to be used and suggested site, for consideration by the Conservators at their next meeting.
- Grass.—A letter was received from Mr. Bertram S. Beale calling attention to the very untidy condition of the small portion of the Common facing Eridge Road between the Pump Room and Montacute Road.
 - The Surveyor reported that he had cleared the long rough grass on the portion of the Common referred to and his action was approved.
- Bonfires.—Questions relating to bonfires on Rusthall Common were considered.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Committee for consideration and report.

Riding Bicycles on the Common.—Questions relating to the riding of bicycles on the Common were considered.

RESOLVED—That the attention of the Chief Constable be called to the matter with a view to the necessary action being taken.



- Amittee's Report.—The following Report of the proceedings of the Committee of the Conservators at a meeting held on the 13th October, 1936, was submitted to the Conservators:—
 - 1—Riding on Commons.—The Committee considered the plan submitted by the Surveyor showing an area on Rusthall Common lying to the West of the Coach Road over which it was suggested an Order might be made by the Commons Conservators prohibiting riding thereon.
 - (a) Resolved—That the matter be referred back to the Commons Conservators without any recommendation thereon from this Committee.
 - **2—Ponds.**—The letter from Mrs. L. Evelyn Leeder with regard to the pond on the Common near the back entrance to "Rust Hall" was considered.
 - (a) RESOLVED—That this Committee recommend that the Commons Conservators do instruct their Clerk to enquire of Mrs. Leeder whether, in the event of the Conservators being prepared further to consider the filling in of the pond in question, she would be willing to pay the cost of the necessary drainage and other works estimated at £60.
 - The letter from Mrs. L. M. Jones with regard to small pools of water in Bulls Hollow was considered.
 - (b) RESOLVED—That this Committee recommend the Commons Conservators to take no action in the matter.
 - 3—Steps on Common opposite Castle Street.—A letter was received from the Chief Constable intimating that at the Inquest held on the 21st August last on a child who died from injuries received by being knocked down by a motor vehicle whilst crossing London Road from the steps on the Common to Castle Street, the Jury called attention to the danger to which children were exposed at this point and expressed the opinion that a guard rail placed at the foot of the steps would tend to create greater caution being taken by children before crossing the road, that the matter had been placed before the Watch Committee of the Town Council, which Committee had requested that the views of the Commons Conservators should be obtained on the proposal.
 - (a) RESOLVED—That this Committee recommend the Commons Conservators to inform the Watch Committee that no objection would be offered by them to the proposal to set back the steps and provide a level area at the foot thereof with guard rails but the question of the disturbance of the soil was one for the consideration of the Lord of the Manor.
 - 4—Damage to Edges of Common.—The Surveyor reported the steps he had taken either by raising the kerbs or the provision of posts for repairing the damage caused by the encroachment of traffic on the edges of three corners on the Common, and his action was approved.

RESOLVED-

- (1) That no further action be taken with regard to paragraph 1 (a) and that the Clerk be instructed to request the Chief Constable to give instructions that all cases of riding on the Commons, contrary to the Bye-Laws, should be reported with a view to proceedings being taken against the offenders.
- (2) That resolutions 2 (a) and (b) and resolution 3 (a) be approved.
- (3) That the minute under paragraph 4 be approved.

Footpaths.—A letter was received from Mr. F. Cartwright calling attention to the path from Hungershall Park to the Eridge Road Railway Bridge which, in his opinion, was steep and dangerous.

The Surveyor reported and it was RESOLVED—That no action be taken in the matter

A letter was received from Captain Newton calling attention to the soiling by cows and horses of the path leading from Rusthall Common through the "Midway," Nevill Court to the High Rocks Lane.

RESOLVED—That as the footpath, in question, is not within the jurisdiction of the Conservators, the letter be referred to the Works Committee of the Corporation.

Eridge Road Lake.—A letter was received from Mr. H. T. Smith suggesting that an addition to the many amenities of this beautiful district would be to clean out the Eridge Road lake, to make it attractive, especially for model yacht enthusiasts, widen the footpaths around the lake provide more seats and some flower beds.

RESOLVED—That Mr. H. T. Smith be informed that his suggestion shall receive consideration if and when funds are available for the purpose indicated.

Clearance of Undergrowth on Commons.—A letter was received from Canon T. G. Gilling-Lax requesting that, as the work of clearing the Common has commenced, the side of the Common which faces Rusthall Road might be cleared this winter; that apart from the question of improvement of the appearance of the Commons, it was desirable that the part referred to should be completely cleared in connection with the danger arising to the houses in case of fire and also to prevent nuisances being committed in view of the houses; also calling attention to the condition of several of the footpaths leading to the Church, some of which in their present condition were dangerous to those walking there at night.

The Surveyor reported that the work of clearing that part of the Commons to which Canon Gilling-Lax referred was now being carried out and that the repair of the paths mentioned was undertaken by the Works Committee of the Corporation.

RESOLVED—That the letter, in so far as it relates to the paths on the Common, be referred to the Works Committee of the Corporation.

- Roadways on Commons.—The Clerk reported his correspondence with Messrs. Snell & Co. and the Town Clerk, Tunbridge Wells, with regard to the proposed approach across the Common to "St. Helena".
- Rusthall Cricket Ground.—A letter was received from the Secretary to the Rusthall Cricket Club intimating that the question of an extension of the Cricket Ground and the proposed erection of a pavilion was to be considered at a meeting of his Committee.
 - The Clerk reported that he had at present received no further communication from the Rusthall Cricket Club on the matter.
- Ponds.—A letter was received from Messrs. Creasey, Son & Wickenden (on behalf of Mrs. Leeder) intimating that Mrs. Leeder did not feel that she should be called upon to bear the cost of abating the nuisance which she alleged to be caused by a pool of stagnant water near her residence on Rusthall Common and would like to be assured that some definite steps would be taken without further delay which would effectively deal with the trouble.

RESOLVED—That Messrs. Creasey, Son & Wickenden be informed that the Commons Conservators do not consider it incumbent upon them to take any action in the matter of which Mrs. Leeder complained.

- A letter was received from Mrs. L. M. Jones in which she noted the decision arrived at by the Conservators with regard to the destruction of the mosquitoes on the pools of water in Bulls Hollow, Rusthall.
- Riding on Commons.—A letter was received from the Chief Constable, Tunbridge Wells, intimating that the matter of riding on the Commons would receive his attention.
- Grass.—A letter was received from Mr. Bertram S. Beale expressing thanks for the action taken by the Conservators in clearing the long rough grass on the portion of the Common facing Eridge Road between the Pump Room and Montacute Road.
- Paths and Trees.—A letter was received from Mr. J. Scrace calling attention to the much frequented tarred surface path on Rusthall Common leading from Rusthall Road through the rocks to the road leading to Denny Bottom the surface of which had been damaged by recent continuous heavy rains which constituted a danger to pedestrians also calling attention to the cluster of holly trees adjoining the path in question which obstructed the light from the public lamp to the inconvenience of passengers alighting from motor omnibuses at this point.

RESOLVED—That the question of the condition of the footpath be referred to the Works Committee of the Corporation and that the question of the holly trees be referred to the Surveyor to do what was necessary.

Town Planning Scheme.—The Clerk reported that, on behalf of the Conservators, he had given notice of objection to the Scheme prepared by the Town Council in so far as it related to the Commons.

RESOLVED—That the action of the Clerk be approved and that the matter be referred to the Committee with power to take such course as might seem to them advisable in the interests of the Conservators for the protection of the Commons.

Damage to Fence.—The Clerk reported that damage had been occasioned to the fence, post and rail at the junction of Mount Ephraim and London Road by a motor lorry, and he was instructed to make the necessary claim for recovery of the cost of repairing the damage in question.

- Appointment of Committee.—Resolved—That Messrs. T. C. Allan, C. Berry, W. Maynard, W. C. Raiswell, W. S. Hallett Reed, and Neville R. Stone be appointed a Committee for the ensuing year and that a vote of thanks be given to the Committee for their services during the past year.
- -The Clerk submitted a statement of the estimated expenditure of the Conservators to the 25th March next.

RESOLVED—That the Finance Committee of the Corporation be requested to include in their Estimates for the next financial year the full amount allowable under the Tunbridge Wells Improvement Act, 1890, for the purposes of the Commons Conservators.

Coronation of H.M. King George VI.—Questions relating to the desirability of planting trees on the Commons in commemoration of the Coronation of H.M. King George VI. were considered.

The following letter was received from His Worship the Mayor:—

DEAR SIR,

Special Conservators Meeting, February 2nd, 1937, re Coronation Celebrations.

A suggestion has been made that suitable trees should be planted on the Tunbridge Wells Common as a permanent Memorial of the Coronation of King George VI. and Queen Elizabeth.

It occurs to me that the Conservators may appreciate a letter from me giving some particulars of the proposals I have in mind to submit for their consideration.

First of all may I point out I have been in communication with Mr. Charles Berry, who has approached the Lord of the Manor on my behalf, and the Lord of the Manor has been good enough to consent in principle to the proposal.

Various positions have been suggested and considered with the intention of proposing a form of Planting which would not detract from the natural beauty of the Common nor hinder the present distant views which are a source of pleasure.

The latest ideas are:-

- 1. A circular grove between Mount Edgcumbe and the Queens Grove:
- 2. And in addition, an avenue of trees on the north and south sides of the "Donkey Road," *i.e.*, the road connecting London Road from a point facing Vale Royal to Castle Road.

These could be named the King's Grove and the King's Avenue respectively or some other names which the Conservators may prefer.

A plan showing the suggested positions will be provided for the Conservators' consideration.

About 40 trees appear to be necessary, viz.:—

King's Grove ... 12 trees in a circle 90 ft. across, placed 25 ft. apart.

King's Avenue ... 14 trees each side of roadway spaced about 30 ft. apart and transversely from 32 ft. to 40 ft. as may be decided.

The kind of tree for each position must be considered after examination of the sub-soil, but beautiful flowering trees, with autumnal richness of tint, is favoured, each tree being a specimen one.

I shall be pleased to further explain these notes, which I am hoping will assist the Conservators in their prior consideration.

The Mayor explained in detail the proposals contained in his letter and submitted a plan showing suggested sites for the trees in question, and stated that he would be willing to present them.

RESOLVED—That the Conservators do approve of the proposal to plant trees on the Common in commemoration of the Accession and Coronation of H.M. King George VI. and do record their appreciation of and thanks to His Worship the Mayor for his proposed gift of the trees, which they gratefully accept.

Mr. G. I. Adams attended the meeting and discussed with the Conservators types of tree suitable for planting on the two sites in question.

RESOLVED—That the types and position of the trees and the provision of tree guards be referred to a Sub-Committee consisting of the Mayor, Messrs. Allan, Scrace and Raiswell, with power to co-opt a Representative of the Lord of the Manor, and also with power to act.

The Mayor reported to the Conservators that he proposed to arrange for an Official Ceremony of the planting of the trees on Wednesday, the 3rd March next, at 3 p.m.

A letter was received from the Town Clerk, Tunbridge Wells, intimating that the Coronation Celebrations Committee had been considering the form the celebrations of this event should take in the Borough and had instructed him to enquire whether, in the event of it being so desired, the Commons Conservators would be prepared to give their sanction to the following:—

- 1. The construction of a bonfire on the Common approximately 50 yards south of the Wellington Rocks
- 2. The erection of a platform on the south side of the Wellington Rocks.
- 3. The erection of any platform or apparatus required by the entertainers on a site above the Queen's Grove
- 4. The erection of the necessary tabling, etc., for the service of refreshments to the school children on the area of the Common lying between the Upper Cricket Ground and the Wellington Rocks
- 5. To the holding of sports on the Upper and Lower Cricket Grounds.

RESOLVED—That general consent be given to the application, it being a condition of such consent that the Town Council undertake to make good any damage which may be done in or about the execution of any works, including such reparations of the turf as may be needful.

RESOLVED—That the Coronation Celebrations Committee be informed that the Commons Conservators in giving their consent to the erection of a bonfire on the Common request that the work of the construction of the bonfire should not be commenced until three weeks before the 12th May next and that it should be constructed under the supervision of the Surveyor to the Commons Conservators.

Water Mains.—A letter was received from the Town Clerk, Tunbridge Wells, transmitting copy of a Notice which had been served on the Lord of the Manor with regard to the laying of a water main in London Road.

Damage to Fence.—A letter received from the Motor Union Insurance Co., Ltd., with regard to a claim made by the Commons Conservators against their Insured for damage to a fence post and rail at the junction of Mt. Ephraim and London Road, Tunbridge Wells, on the 28th November last, and requesting to be furnished with an estimate of the cost of repairs.

The Clerk reported that he had furnished the information asked for and that the amount of the claim had been paid.

Guard Rails.—A letter was received from the Borough Surveyor intimating that the Town Council desired to erect guard rails for the protection of pedestrians at the top of the steps on the footpath leading from the Common to the General Post Office, London Road, in the position indicated on the plan enclosed with his letter and enquiring if the Conservators had any objection to the proposal.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Committee for consideration and report.

Chairman.—At this juncture the Chair was vacated by Mr. Alderman Allan and His Worship the Mayor then took the Chair.

Commemorative Tree Planting.—The Sub-Committee (consisting of His Worship the Mayor, Messrs. T. C. Allan, W. Maynard and W. C. Raiswell) submitted the following proceedings at its meeting held on the 2nd February last:—

The Sub-Committee considered the types and position of the trees to be presented by His Worship the Mayor (Mr. Councillor Strange) and also the provision of tree guards.

- 14 "Cherry Hisakura" trees on each side of the road commonly known as "The Donkey Road".
- The Sub-Committee also considered the suggested name for the grove of trees, "The King's Grove" and the re-naming of "The Donkey Road" as "The King's Avenue".

RESOLVED—That the name to be given to the grove of trees be deferred to the next meeting of the Common Conservators for consideration and that application be made to the Watch Committee of the Town Council for approval to the re-naming of "The Donkey Road" as "The King's Avenue".

RESOLVED—That this Sub-Committee recommend the Commons Conservators to provide the necessary tree guards for the trees to be planted in the grove and avenue.

RESOLVED—That the proceedings of the Sub-Committee be approved and that the recommendations therein contained be adopted and acted upon.

Building on Common.—A letter was received from Lt.-Col. W. M. Power enquiring if a space on the Common opposite the Tunbridge Wells Art Gallery could be surrendered or leased for a building to be used for the reception of the painting "King of Kings" such building to be known as "The Sanctuary".

RESOLVED—That Lt.-Col. W. M. Power be informed that the Commons Conservators have no power to assent to such a proposal.

Trees.—A letter was received from Miss Elizabeth Mann calling attention to the condition of the trees outside her house in Eridge Road and requesting that they should be cut and lopped this spring.

RESOLVED—That the letter be referred to the Committee with power to act

Shelter Seats.—A letter was received from Mr. S. H. Dowsett suggesting the provision of an additional sheltered seat on the Common in lieu of the proposed planting of trees on the Common.

RESOLVED—That Mr. S. H. Dowsett be informed that as the question oplanting trees had been decided it was not possible to adopt his suggestion

Accounts for Payment.—Accounts amounting to £181 9s. 6d. (as per list signed by the Chairman) were passed for payment.

- Car Park—Carlton (or Lord Cornwallis) Hotel.—The Clerk reported a telephonic message he had received from Col. Seymer (Architect to Fredk. Leney & Sons, Ltd.) with regard to the proposal of his Clients to construct a Car Park adjoining the Carlton (or Lord Cornwallis) Hotel on a portion of the Common adjoining their premises in Eridge Road.
 - It was reported to the Conservators that the Lord of the Manor and Freehold Tenants had given their consent to the proposal.
 - Plans and specification of the works in connection with the proposed car park were laid before the Committee.
 - Mr. John Marchant, the Managing Director of Fredk. Leney & Sons, Ltd., attended the meeting in support of an application for the consent of the Commons Conservators and intimated that the car park was to be used as a public park for private cars only, that no charge would be made for its use, and that it would be open to the public at all times.

- Riding and Driving on Commons.—Mr. H. Elwig again called the attention of the Conservators to the riding of bicycles and the driving of vans on a path on the Common near the top of London Road, and he was requested to supply the Clerk with particulars of any alleged offenders.
- Re-naming of "The Donkey Road."—A letter was received from the Town Clerk with reference to the application for the approval of the Watch Committee to the re-naming of "The Donkey Road" as "The King's Avenue" and intimating that the Watch Committee had come to the conclusion that it was preferable that the road in question should retain its existing name.
- Coronation Celebrations.—A letter was received from the Town Clerk applying for consent to a Fireworks Display on the Lower Cricket Ground in connection with the Coronation Celebrations on the evening of Saturday, May 15th.
 - The Clerk reported that he had sent a copy of the application to each Conservator with an intimation that unless he heard to the contrary he proposed to give the consent asked for, and in view of the fact that no Conservator had dissented he had given the necessary consent on behalf of the Conservators.

- Sewers.—A letter was received from the Borough Surveyor intimating that owing to various obstructions in the line of the new 24in. surface water sewer, it was proposed to alter the line, which necessitated passing under the grass island situated at the corner of Lower Green Road and Ashley Gardens, Rusthall, that the necessary statutory notices would be served in due course and enquiring if there were any objections to the work proceeding as it was of a somewhat urgent character.

The Clerk's reply was read and approved.

- A letter was received from the Town Clerk transmitting copy of a Notice served on the Lord of the Manor with reference to the laying of the sewer in question through a portion of the Commons.

Newton calling attention to the gorse bushes on the Common on the Tunbridge Wells side of the entrance to Nevill Park, Langton Road, which obstructed the view of traffic approaching from the direction of The Spa Hotel when emerging from Nevill Park and turning to the right.
 - The Surveyor reported that he had trimmed the gorse bushes referred to and his action was approved.
- Commemorative Tree Planting—Donkey Road.—A letter was received from the Honorary Secretary of the Coronation Planting Committee submitting a quotation for the supply of bronze Coronation plaques at a cost of 10s. 6d. each.

RESOLVED—That the quotation be not accepted.

- It was reported to the Conservators that two of the trees planted in the land adjoining the Donkey Road had died.

Improvement Act 1890 (comprising the material sections) and a copy of the Bye-Laws made by the said Conservators under the said Act are hereto annexed.

Prevention of Fires on Commons.—The following letter was read:—

Dear Sir,

Fire Prevention (Business Premises) Order, 1941.

The Regional Commissioner has recently drawn attention to the danger which may arise through undergrowth on the Common being set alight by incendiary bombs. The danger would be not only to property situated on the Common, if the fire became of serious dimensions, but would also arise from the fact that the fire would serve as a beacon to enemy aircraft.

In order to meet this situation, my Council is prepared under the Air Raid Precautions Act, 1937, to place additional funds at the disposal of the Conservators in order that the undergrowth may be cleared.

The Emergency Committee has asked if the Conservators would be good enough to prepare a scheme for this purpose and submit it to the Committee, together with an estimate of the cost involved.

I enclose herewith an additional copy of this letter for the use of the Surveyor to the Conservators.

I may add that the Regional Commissioner regards this matter as one of urgency, and I am authorised by the Mayor to say that he would be agreeable to an early meeting of the Conservators being convened to discuss the subject.

The Clerk reviewed the earlier correspondence which the Mayor had had with the Regional Commissioner with regard to the prevention of fires on the Commons which might be caused by enemy action.

Dear Mr. Mayor,

With reference to your letter of the 14th March and earlier correspondence regarding the prevention of fires on the Commons in Tunbridge

Wells, I am now in a position to inform you that the Ministry of Home Security will be prepared to accept for purposes of grant, approved expenditure on clearing the undergrowth on the Commons or such part of them as are considered to be a potential danger in the event of their being set alight by incendiary bombs and so lighting up the town for a further enemy attack.

This grant would have to be paid to the Borough Council who would meet the expenditure in the first place and claim grant on the same basis as for any other expenditure on Air Raid (Fire) Precautions. If as is probable the total expenditure of the Borough on Air Raid Precautions met from rates now exceeds the product of a penny rate, grant would be at the rate of 75 per cent. of the approved expenditure.

The Commissioner would be glad to know as soon as possible that the Council agree to the above arrangement and to receive a formal application for grant together with an estimate of the total cost involved.

SURVEYOR'S REPORT.

13th January, 1942.

Letter from "National Fire Service," dated 8th January, 1942, respecting "Sites for Circular Steel Dams" on Common.

I have been in touch with the National Fire Service, Dunorlan for information in regard to the above, and understand—one Tank or Dam, is proposed to be fixed on a fairly level part of the T.W. Common approximately opposite the Wellington Hotel, and the second tank on the corner of the Common at the junction of Bishops Down (Inner) Road and the south end of Hurstwood Lane.

The tanks consist of steel plates bolted together in circular form and are proposed to be erected on a concrete floor. I understand no metal top, or bottom, is provided, and that the steel sides are to be embedded in the concrete to ensure watertightness at the base.

A circular tank of 34ft. diameter as mentioned in the National Fire Service letter, to hold 23,000 gallons would require a depth of 4ft. of water. I think, therefore, some strong and effective form of cover to the tanks should be provided, as small children may easily climb up the sides and fall into the tanks, involving a risk of drowning.

It would be advisable also, to have the tanks fenced around, with close chestnut spile fencing in order to reduce the risks above mentioned.

The tanks should, of course, be made and maintained, watertight at the base and at the joints of the steel sheeting and the fencing and covers kept in thorough good order.

As the Common is a public place, accessible to all at all times I think the Conservators should be absolved from all responsibility for possible damage and accidents, such, for example, as mishaps of the kind above indicated. Also, I presume, an undertaking would be given by the proper authority to remove the concrete bases and tanks, and make good and turf the surfaces of the Common at the two sites upon the termination of the War.

Tunbridge Wells and Rusthall Commons.—The Surveyor submitted the following Report on matters affecting the Tunbridge Wells and Rusthall Commons:—

Twenty-nine entrenchments have been excavated by the military (or Home Guard) during recent months. These are widely scattered over the Tunbridge Wells Commons and new ones are occasionally made.

On the 11th March last I drew the attention of Capt. Jones (H.G.), Boyne House, to the need of some simple rough fencing around these excavations as I considered them dangerous to the public without a precautionary guard.

The excavations are about 5 feet deep, and in one case, the trench was nearly full of water. Rough fencings have since been provided by the Home Guard.

I think it would be advisable if some understanding, applying generally over the Commons, could be arrived at, ensuring at a later date, the filling in of these excavations and making good of the turfing by the military authorities. New material will have to be carted to the sites for filling in some cases.

A large part of Rusthall Common, near the Cricket Ground, on both the north and south sides of the main Langton Road, was occupied by anti-aircraft men and equipment at the end of April last.

Forms of requisition of the site were received on 12th May, 1942.

The greater part of the men and equipment left the site after a stay of some three or four weeks.

Two oak trees and five small thorn trees were cut down by the men in occupation of the A.A. Camp—presumably for sighting purposes.

One of the oak trees was about 8 feet in circumference at the base and the other 2 feet circumference. The largest oak was situated near the junction of Tea Garden Lane and Langton Main Road, where it now lies.

Five oak seats and some oak fencing posts (near the "Marlpits," Rusthall Common) have also been noted to be missing since the A.A. occupation of the site.

Other damage consists mainly of surface damage by Army vehicles arising mostly during wet weather.

There is a certain amount of litter, barbed wire and other material to be cleared up later on, including small branches from trees and bushes used as camouflage.

I presume the Military Authorities will undertake, when approached by "Claim," to make good damage of all kinds at a later date.

It is not definitely known, at the site, whether the Military will return to the full occupation of the area requisitioned by them.

The iron railings around the Upper and Lower Cricket Grounds, around plots of Common in London Road opposite the General Post Office and small lots at other places, have now been removed as salvage by the Ministry of Works and Buildings.

The construction of one of the three new static water tanks, for fire extinction purposes, on the Common, near Bredbury, was started during the first week in June.

Staff, 12th Corps, referring to the report of the Surveyor to the Conservators with regard to trenches and emplacements on the Commons, intimating that the entrenchments on the Tunbridge Wells Common were on ground which had been requisitioned, under an omnibus requisition, and the area on Rusthall Common was also requisitioned; any damage which arose from military ccapation would be dealt with by the War Department Land Agent and Valuer.

S. V. There reported that negotiations were now proceeding between the gents of the Lord of the Manor and the Military Authorities with regard to mixtary works carried out on the Commons.

The Surveyor reported an interview he had had with a representative of the War Department Land Agent and Valuer with regard to defence works and the requisitioning of land on the Commons, and that the representative had undertaken shortly to address a letter to the Conservators setting out in detail the present position with regard to these defence works and requisitioned land.

The question of the conditions under which static water basins may be built on land under the Control of the Commons Conservators has been reviewed and it is thought that it would be preferable that possession of the various sites by the N.F.S. should be covered by formal requisition under the powers of Defence Regulation No. 51. The exercise of these powers would not involve the Conservators in any question of consent to the works and would therefore, dispose of any difficulties as regards indemnity against accidents or liability for damage. The N.F.S. would of course, take all reasonable steps to prevent children having access to the basins and to maintain the basins in water-tight condition so far as this is possible, and full consideration would be given at any time to representations by the Conservators on these points. that the Conservators will be able to agree to this procedure, in which case I will ask the Town Clerk, Tunbridge Wells, in exercise of statutory powers delegated to him by the Secretary of State, to serve formal notice of requisition.

I may add that the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries have agreed that as regards works on common land which are necessary for public safety or for the prosecution of the war, there is no objection to recourse to Defence Regulation 51 on the understanding that no building of a permanent nature is erected, and that any obstruction is removed and the land restored after the termination of the present emergency. These conditions will be complied with in respect of the static water basins in question.

Trees.—A letter was received from Mr. Robert E. Frost requesting that the Conservators would allow two birch trees and one sycamore tree on the Common, on the south side of Romanoff Lodge, to be cut down as they interfered with light and air and helped to make the property damp, and he would undertake to pay all costs of cutting down and carting away and any other expenses which might be involved.

Seats.—A letter addressed to the Mayor received from Miss L. A. Vick calling attention to the dearth of seats on the Common and elsewhere was submitted and the Mayor reported the reply he had sent to Miss Vick.

RESOLVED—That no further action be taken in the matter.

Grass Cutting.—A letter was received from Mr. C. A. Peckham requesting the Conservators to cut the grass on the Common opposite No. 19, Eridge Road.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to cut the grass when labour is available for the purpose.

Trees.—A letter was received from Mr. R. R. Needham requesting that the two holly trees adjoining Gibraltar Cottage might be thinned out.

The Surveyor reported that he had carried out the work and his action was approved.

Services on Common.—The Clerk submitted a letter received from the Jehovah Witnesses requesting permission to use a site on the Lower Cricket Ground for four openair Bible talks on Sunday afternoons during September.

The Clerk's reply thereto was read and approved.

Expenditure.—The Surveyor reported on the expenditure on wages and private works for the current financial year.

Accounts for Year ended 31st March, 1945.—The Borough Treasurer (Mr. D. L. Copeman) submitted revised accounts for the year ended 31st March, 1945, showing a deficit at that date of £262. 3s. 0d

RESOLVED—That the Mayor, as Chairman of the Commons Conservators, be requested to submit to the next meeting of the Finance Committee of the Town Council an application for a supplementary grant of £262. 3s. 0d. in respect of the year ended 31st March, 1945.

RESOLVED—That an estimate of the amount required for the purposes of the Commons Conservators during the next financial year be prepared and considered by the Commons Conservators at their meeting in December next, with a view to an application being made to the Town Council for the provision in its future estimates of an increased grant for the maintenance of the Commons.

Workmen's Shed, Upper Cricket Ground.—The Surveyor reported that he had received an application from the employees on the Common for the provision of some form of heating for cooking purposes in the workmen's shed adjoining the Upper Cricket Ground.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be authorised to provide what he considers necessary for this purpose.

Cheque Books.—The Clerk reported that the present stock of cheque books had been exhausted and that Lloyds Bank, Ltd., were obtaining a design and quotation from their cheque book printers for a supply of new cheque books required by the Commons Conservators which would comply with the Paper Control Order.

RESOLVED-That the matter be referred to the Chairman with power to act.

The Surveyor reported that the grass had now been cut, and his action was approved.

Trees.—A letter was received from Mr. W. Harvey Gervis requesting permission to have the ash tree removed in front of his house, "Grange Cote," Bishops Down, as he alleged that it obscured his view and obstructed the sunshine.

A report was received from the Surveyor on the matter.

RESOLVED—That the application be not acceded to.

An extract from a letter received by Mr. C. E. Westbrook from Lord Monsell calling attention to a small oak tree on the Common which grows only about 10 yards from where a V.1 flying-bomb exploded on the Tunbridge Wells Common, that the tree was badly mutilated but quite alive, and if pruned and looked after, would become a fine tree, that this was rather remarkable and the tree was worth looking after.

The Surveyor reported that the tree in question had been pruned, that it was quite in order at the moment and would be looked after.

RESOLVED—That the Conservators do affix a tablet with appropriate wording to the oak tree in question, recording the event, and that the selection of the tablet and the wording to be inscribed thereon be referred to the Chairman, Mr. C. E. Westbrook and the Clerk with power to act.



Requisitioning of Land.—A letter was received from the W.D. Land Agent and Valuer, West Kent Area, intimating that he was prepared to recommend payment of compensation under section 2 (1) (b) in respect of rough woodland, Hungershall Park Road, The Common, at the figure claimed, namely £53. 13s. 0d., and requesting to be furnished with authority from the Lord of the Manor that this compensation should be paid direct to the Commons Conservators and also a memorandum to the effect that the Freehold Tenants have no claim against the War Department.

RESOLVED—That the Clerk be instructed to obtain the authority and memorandum asked for by the W.D. Land Agent and Valuer.

A further letter was received from the W.D. Land Agent and Valuer intimating that he was prepared to recommend the payment of £37. 8s. 2d. in respect of the military car park on the south-west side of Hungershall Park Road, but regretted he could not agree to all the figures submitted in the claim in respect of the military car park on the north side of the road, submitting amended figures which showed a total reduction on the claim from £94. 19s. 2d. to £82. 19s. 11d. and enquiring if the Conservators were prepared to accept this amended amount in full settlement of compensation, and if so, to furnish him with an authority from the Lord of the Manor for the amount to be paid to the Conservators and a memorandum from the Freehold Tenants that they have no claim against the War Department in respect thereof.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to communicate with the appropriate Authorities with regard to the de-requisitioning of all sites on the Commons used for military purposes.

RESOLVED—That the Borough Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the work of removal of the N.F.S. emergency water tanks on the Tunbridge Wells and Rusthall Commons to be expedited.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to report on the present condition of the sites constructed by the Home Guard on the Commons where the surface has not yet been restored to its former condition.

Footways on Common.—A letter was received from Mr.W. Grant Oliver again calling attention to the alleged footway between Lower Green Road and Rusthall High Street, that in 1943 the Lord of the Manor did not see his way to consent to the making up of the surface of the footway in question and requesting that the Conservators would consider renewing the application for consent to the Lord of the Manor.

RESOLVED—That no action be taken in the matter.

- Straying Cattle.—A Police Report was received with regard to heifers straying on the Common on the 23rd November last, and the action taken by the Police in the matter.

- The late Mr. H. Elwig.—RESOLVED—That a sincere vote of sympathy and condolence be passed with Mrs. Elwig and her family on the death of Mr. Henry Elwig, who has been a Commons Conservator (representing the Lord of the Manor) for the past 25 years, and that an expression of the Conservators' regret at the loss of so esteemed a colleague be recorded on the minutes and communicated to Mrs. Elwig.
- Minutes.—The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.
- Appointment of Treasurer.—A letter was received from Mr. W. F. M. Hopkins, formally resigning his appointment as Treasurer to the Commons Conservators, and intimating that, if the Commons Conservators were willing to appoint Mr. E. B. - Undergrowth, etc., on the Commons.—A letter was received from Mr. A. H. Stanley thanking the Commons Conservators for their co-operation in the matter of the clearance of the undergrowth on the area of the Common adjoining his residence.
- Footway on Common between Lower Green Road and Rusthall High Street.—A letter was received from Messrs. Berry & Berry intimating that a copy of the petition submitted to the Commons Conservators with regard to this footway had been transmitted to Mr. F. O. Baird, the Lord of the Manor.
 - A letter was received from the Lord of the Manor, Mr. F. O. Baird (addressed to His Worship the Mayor), intimating that he had received several applications with regard to the making up of the track across the Common from Lower Green Road to Rusthall High Street. That the position with regard to this track was very simple. He was only tenant for life and his powers were strictly limited by the Settled Land Acts and, by virtue of these Acts, he could not part with any portion of the trust property which included the Commons, except inter alia for the best rent or price reasonably obtainable. The making up of this track was obviously of value to the shops and house property to which it leads and, therefore, he could not sanction any proposal to convert the track into a made path except on receiving the full value to those who would benefit by it but up to the present no rent representing the value of the land had been offered.
- Trees.—A letter was received from Mr. L. Leroy with regard to the trees on the Common adjoining Priory Lodge, London Road, intimating that he had purchased the property and it had been unoccupied, except by the Military, for some considerable time; the trees which surround the property on the Common had not been cut back, and owing to the fact that these trees do not let light and air to the property he requested that it might be arranged for a representative of the Commons Conservators to meet him and discuss the matter.
 - The Surveyor reported that he had met Mr. Leroy on the site and on the present condition of the trees and the high holly hedge which overhangs the cobble footpath leading from London Road to Mount Ephraim which belonged to the property.

RESOLVED—That the consideration of the matter be deferred to the next meeting of the Conservators in order that the liabilities of the owner or occupier of the property and the approaches thereto could be ascertained.

Insurance.—A letter was received from the Borough Treasurer intimating that he had been approached by the Branch Manager of the Ocean Accident and Guarantee Corporation, Ltd., with regard to the transfer of the agency through which the Commons Conservators' policy was arranged, from his predecessor, Mr. G. Porter, to himself, and enquiring if the Conservators were agreeable to this transfer.

RESOLVED—That the Commons Conservators do agree to the transfer of the agency.

Fencing, Mount Ephraim.—The Surveyor reported on the fencing adjoining the footpath on Mount Ephraim, opposite to the Mount Ephraim Hotel, and estimated the cost of reinstating the fencing at £67.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to carry out the work.

Labour.—The Surveyor reported the difficulties he had experienced in obtaining suitable labour for work on the Commons.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be authorised to advertise in the local press for labour required on the Commons.

- **Damage on Commons.**—Questions relating to the protection of the Commons against damage were discussed.
- Emergency Water Tanks.—Questions relating to the clearance of the bases of emergency water tanks on the Common were discussed.
 - The Surveyor reported that the clearance of the bases of these water tanks had been provided for in a scheme for the demolition and clearance of all Civil Defence structures in the Borough which had been submitted for approval to the Home Office.
- Coronation Trees on the Common.—Resolved—That the Surveyor be instructed to clear seeded trees from the group of chestnut trees above the Queen's Grove and to replace one dead and one broken chestnut tree, and also to replace two dead Japanese cherry trees on the Common adjoining the Donkey Drive.

Minutes.—The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

- "Belleville," The Common.—A letter was received from Mrs. Elwig calling attention to the sinkage in the ground between the front path and the cobble path near her premises and to the condition of her path caused by persons using the steps instead of the cobble path.
 - The Surveyor reported that the sinkage in the ground was caused by a defective drain, he had carried out the necessary work, and his action was approved.
- Lower Cricket Ground.—A letter was received from the Hungershall United Football Club intimating that the Club had come to an agreement for the use of the Lower Cricket Ground on Saturday afternoons during the season 1946/47; that the ground was in rather a rough condition and requesting that the Conservators would improve the surface of the ground to make it playable.
 - The Surveyor reported that he had cut the grass but had no labour available to carry out further work and his action was approved.

 Resolved—That the Surveyor be instructed, as soon as possible, to fill up the holes and re-turf the track running across the west side of the Lower Cricket Ground.
- Trees.—A letter was received from the Secretary to the Freehold Tenants intimating that he had been instructed by the Lord of the Manor to inform the Conservators that he had no objection to the Conservators cutting down the dangerous tree near Montacute Gardens, Eridge Road, and he had made arrangements for the sale of this tree and also another tree which recently blew down in that road.
 - The Surveyor reported that the tree in question had been cut down and his action was approved.
- Undergrowth on Common.—A letter was received from Dr. H. O. Butler calling attention to alleged extreme danger to motor traffic caused by the size of the bushes growing at the south-east junction of Nevill Park and Langton Road, and requesting that the matter might receive attention.
 - The Surveyor reported that the bushes had been cut down and the line of sight improved and Dr. Butler had requested him to convey his thanks to the Conservators for having this work carried out.
 - A letter was received from Mr. F. Whitmore, Headmaster of Rusthall Boys' School, making a similar request on the grounds of safety for the 200 pupils from his school who daily use the crossing near the entrance to Nevill Park, and pointing out that the cutting back of the blackthorn bushes would greatly extend the line of sight of approaching traffic from the crossing in question.
- Opening of Ground on Common.—A letter was received from the Chief Sanitary Inspector giving formal notice that it had become necessary to open the ground on the Common immediately opposite to No. 8, Lower Green Road, Rusthall, for the purpose of tracing rat infestation at those premises and the work would be carried out by the Corporation.
- Track on Common between Lower Green Road and Rusthall High Street.—A letter was received from Mr. W. Grant Oliver referring to the Mayor's letter to the Lord of the Manor, and his reply thereto, with reference to the track across the Common from Lower Green Road to Rusthall High Street, pointing out that the position seemed to be that the Conservators recognised the urgent need for the surface of this track to be made up and that the Lord of the Manor was prepared to give

his consent on payment of a rent; that as explained by the Lord of the Manor his powers were limited by the Settled Land Acts and as Trustee, his consent carried with it the obligation of imposing a rent which he thought should be assessed by the benefit it would confer on those who used the track, and these comprised a large number of residents at Rusthall and Lower Green Road who desired to get to the shops, etc., who would increase in number when residents of new houses have access to Lower Green Road; that up to the present no rent had been offered, and requesting that the Conservators endeavour to obtain from the Lord of the Manor a statement of what rent he considers his Trusteeship justified him in asking.

RESOLVED—That this is not a matter in which the Conservators have any right of action at all, but that it be referred to the Town Council to consider the desirability in the interest of the general public of paying a rental to obtain the consent of the Lord of the Manor to the track being made up as a footpath.

Chairman.—At this juncture of the proceedings His Worship the Mayor had to vacate the Chair to keep another appointment.

RESOLVED—That the Deputy Mayor (Mr. Alderman Westbrook) do take the Chair.

- Vacancy in Representation of Town Council on Commons Conservators.—The Clerk reported that he had been notified by the Town Clerk that there was a vacancy in the representation of the Town Council on the Commons Conservators caused by the resignation of Mr. E. B. Weekes as an Alderman of the Borough.
- Employees.—The Surveyor reported that six men were now employed on the Commons.
- Emergency Water Tanks.—The Surveyor reported that the emergency water tanks on the Common had been removed and the sites would, in due course, be made good as labour was available.

Road Leading to Rustwick.—The Surveyor submitted a letter he had received from Mr. A. C. Nuttall calling attention to the condition of the road leading to Rustwick on Rusthall Common, and enquiring if something could be done to improve the surface for its use by motorists.

RESOLVED—That Mr. A. C. Nuttall be informed that the road in question is not under the jurisdiction of the Commons Conservators and to suggest to him that he should approach the Lord of the Manor in the matter.

Mann requesting that the trees in front of her residence, No. 24, Eridge Road, might be lopped; that this work was carried out every year before the war but nothing had been done since, and the trees had grown to a considerable size and excluded light and sun and caused dampness to her residence.

Damage to Seats and Trees on the Commons.—A letter was received from the Chief Constable of Kent with reference to the suggested enrolment of a suitable employee of the Conservators as a special constable for the purpose of exercising supervision over the Commons, intimating that there were several reasons which rendered it undesirable for such an employee to be appointed under the Special Constables Order, 1923, and suggesting that the Conservators' requirements might be met by it appointing an employee as a special constable under Section 174 of the Tunbridge Wells Improvement Act, 1890.

RESOLVED—That, in view of the fact that the Common Ranger is not prepared to undertake the duties of special constable, no further action be taken in this connection, but that the Clerk be instructed to draw the attention of the Police Authority to the need for more police control of the Commons.

- Sewers.—The Clerk submitted to the Conservators copy of a Notice served by the Tunbridge Wells Corporation upon the Lord of the Manor of their intention to construct a sewer through land forming part of the Tunbridge Wells Common.
- Post Office Telephones.—An application was received from the Telephone Manager, Post Office Telephones, for permission to erect three pillars and cabinets at points on the Commons in the vicinity of Lower Green Road, the road to Denny Bottom and the Thurlstane Hotel, Mount Ephraim.
 - The Lord of the Manor's representatives intimated that in their opinion this was a matter over which the Conservators had no jurisdiction.

RESOLVED—(Messrs. Berry, Card, and Thorpe voting against)—That the Commons Conservators do raise no objection to the erection of the cabinets and pillars in question.

- Rusthall Common.—A letter was received from Mr. A. L. Rush, Secretary to the Freehold Tenants, intimating that at a meeting of the Freehold Tenants a Miss Taylor, living near Bulls Hollow, had complained that the trees and hedges in that vicinity were being mutilated by employees of the Conservators.
 - The Surveyor reported that the work in question was being carried out following the request received from Mrs. Ellen Jones, submitted to the last meeting of the Conservators, and consisted merely of the removal of portions of a hedge owned by Miss Taylor overhanging the Common.

RESOLVED—That no action be taken in the matter.

It was reported to the Conservators that a boundary wall between the Spa Hotel and the Rusthall Common was in a dilapidated condition and portions of the wall were now strewn across the Common.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to request the owners of the Spa Hotel to remove the portions of wall in question, from the Common.

Questions relating to a parking ground recently formed on the Rusthall Common adjoining "The Morning Star", Public House, were considered.

It was reported that the consent of the Lords of the Manor and Freehold Tenants had been given to the formation of this parking place.

Tunbridge Wells Common.—A letter was received from the Secretary to the Freehold Tenants enclosing copy of a letter he had received from Miss E. A. Cumming requesting the provision of a signpost indicating that the track across the Tunbridge Wells Common from Major Yorke's Road to High Rocks Lane was a footpath only, and further requesting the removal of a number of oak seedlings growing in front of her premises, "The Cottage".

> RESOLVED—That the question of the removal of the seedlings be referred to the Surveyor to take such action as may be necessary, but that no action be taken with regard to the suggestion made by Miss Cumming as to the provision of a notice-board relating to the track across the Common.

- The late Mr. F. R. Kember.—Resolved—That a sincere vote of sympathy and condolence with Mrs. Kember and her family on the death of Mr. F. R. Kember, be passed and that an expression of the Conservators' regret at the loss of so valued and esteemed a colleague, be recorded on the minutes.
- Committee.—Resolved—That three members do form a quorum of the Committee of the Conservators appointed at the last meeting.
- Damage to Seats and Trees on the Commons.—A letter was received from the Chief Constable of Kent with regard to the Conservators' request for more police control of the Commons, intimating that instructions had been given for the police to pay as much attention as possible to the Commons, consistent with their other duties, but that it was not possible to augment the strength of the police in Tunbridge Wells purely for that purpose.
- Emergency Water Supply Sites.—The Clerk reported that notification had been received from the Tunbridge Wells Corporation that the following emergency water supply sites on the Commons were derequisitioned on the 16th January last:—

Opposite No. 79 Mount Ephraim.
Opposite the "Morning Star" P.H.
London Road/Vale Road.
London Road/Mount Ephraim Road.

- Trees.—A letter, signed by thirteen householders residing at Nos. 13-27, Eridge Road, requesting that trees in that road and standing on the Commons, should be cut back, to prevent them obscuring the light, was laid before the Conservators.
 - The Surveyor reported that approximately thirty trees were involved and that no provision had been made in the Estimates for the ensuing year, to enable them to be cut back.

RESOLVED—That the petitioners be so informed and that no further action be taken in the matter at the present time.

- Post Office Telephones.—An application was received from the Telephone Manager, Post Office Telephones, for permission to place telegraph poles (1) in the corner of the footway outside No. 8 Upper Street, Rusthall, (2) in the footway outside Dale Place, Rusthall and (3) near the footway leading to the Toad Rock.
 - The Clerk reported that the sites numbered (1) and (2) above were not on the Commons and that the Conservators had no jurisdiction thereover.

RESOLVED—That no objection be raised to the placing of a pole on the Common, near the footway leading to the Toad Rock, in the position shewn on the plan

accompanying the application provided that the consent of the Lord of the Manor and Freehold Tenants is obtained and that the Clerk be authorised to sign the necessary form.

- Higher Cricket Ground.—Questions relating to the possibility of replacing the iron railings which at one time surrounded the Higher Cricket Ground, were considered and referred to the Clerk to discuss with the Surveyor.
- Employees.—Questions relating to the adequacy of the supervision of employees engaged on work on the Commons were considered.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Committee, to discuss with the Surveyor and to take any action thereon which it deems to be desirable.

Notice Boards.—Mr. R. S. R. Berry called the attention of the Conservators to the misleading nature of certain notice boards on the Commons.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Surveyor.

- The late Mr. F. R. Kember.—A letter was received from the relatives of the late Mr. F. R. Kember thanking the Conservators for the resolution of sympathy passed at their last meeting.
- Appointment of Conservator.—A letter was received from the Lord of the Manor notifying the appointment of Mr. C. H. Strange as one of his representatives as a Commons Conservator in the place of the late Mr. F. R. Kember.
- Committee.—The Clerk reported that, from time to time, matters requiring urgent attention arose, upon which it was not possible to obtain a decision without convening a special meeting of the Conservators.

RESOLVED—That the Committee be authorised to deal with any matters of urgency arising between meetings of the Conservators.

RESOLVED—That Mr. R. W. Card be appointed a member of the Committee in the place of Mr. S. V. Thorpe.

Trees.—The Clerk submitted letters from Messrs. A. Allistone and A. E. Streek requesting the Conservators to reconsider their decision not to cut back the trees on the Common adjoining Nos. 13-27 Eridge Road.

RESOLVED—That the Conservators do adhere to their previous decision in this matter.

The Surveyor reported that, with the permission of the Lord of the Manor, he had removed two dead trees from the Tunbridge Wells Common, one from opposite No. 16 Eridge Road and the other from opposite the Earl's Court Hotel, Mount Ephraim.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor's action be approved.

Rusthall Common.—The Clerk reported that since the last meeting he had received an application from the Officer Commanding, 206 L.A.A. Battery, Royal Artillery, for permission to hold a Military Exercise on the Rusthall Common on the 30th March last and that, after consulting representatives of the Town Council, Lord of the Manor and Freehold Tenants, he had given the necessary permission, at the same time reminding the applicants of the necessity for obtaining the consent of the Lord of the Moanor

RESOLVED-That the Clerk's action be confirmed.

- Sheltered Seat.—The Clerk submitted a Police report on damage caused to the Sheltered Seat on the Tunbridge Wells Common on the 11th March last; stating that after exhaustive enquiries it had not been possible to apprehend the persons responsible for the damage.
 - The Surveyor reported that the Sheltered Seat on the Common had now been re-roofed with shingles and that the remaining repairs were in hand.
- Gibraltar Cottage.—A letter was received from Mrs. N. F. Gibson calling the attention of the Conservators to the damage caused by children to her property, Gibraltar Cottage, and requesting the provision of a notice board warning the public that action would be taken against persons causing damage to property on the Commons

RESOLVED—That Mrs. Gibson be informed that the Conservators regret that they are unable to accede to her request.

- Tunbridge Wells Common.—A letter was received from the Tunbridge Wells Evening Townswomen's Guild calling attention to the danger of broken glass on the Common.
 - The Surveyor reported that the amount of broken glass now found on the Commons was due to the fact that when fires occurred, numerous bottles and tins were exposed and that he had given instructions for these to be collected and removed as soon as possible after each fire.

RESOLVED—That the Townswomen's Guild be so informed.

- A letter was received from the Secretary to the Freehold Tenants intimating that he had been instructed to call the attention of the Conservators to the following matters:—
 - (a) the present unsatisfactory state of the Commons generally;
 - (b) the need for action to prevent the firing of the Commons;
 - (c) the need for action to prevent cycling on the footpaths.

RESOLVED—That matter (a) be referred to the Committee to consider in conjunction with the question of ensuring adequate supervision of employees engaged on work on the Commons, that with regard to (b) the Freehold Tenants be informed of the action proposed by the Conservators in cases of wilful damage in future, where the offenders are detected and that the Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Police Authority with a view to the enforcement of the Conservators' Bye-law prohibiting cycling on the Commons.

- The Surveyor reported that the work of clearing the bracken and undergrowth on the Tunbridge Wells Common was proceeding but that it would now need to be abandoned until the Autumn and the labour transferred to grass cutting.
- The Surveyor also reported that he had received a request from Miss D. James that attention should be given to that portion of the Common between the Upper Race Course and the path from Hungershall Park to Nevill Park and that he had informed Miss James that it was hoped to clear that part of the Common during the present year.
- Damage to Commons.—The Clerk reported the receipt of a letter from the Secretary to the Freehold Tenants with regard to damage caused by children to the rocks on the Rusthall Common and on the action taken with regard thereto.

31st May, 1949.—At a meeting of the Commons Conservators held at the Town Hall.

PRESENT—The Mayor (Councillor Miss Wells) (Chairman).

Messrs. T. C. Allan, R. S. R. Berry, R. W. Card, W. S. Hallett Reed, F. F. Howarth, W. C. Raiswell, H. A. Sheppard, C. H. Strange and S. V. Thorpe.

- Appointment of Conservators.—The Clerk reported that the Home Secretary had now made an Order amending the provisions of Section 153 of the Tunbridge Wells Improvement Act, 1890, to enable appointments of Conservators to be made on a date in May to conform to the new date of the Annual Meeting of the Town Council.
 - The Clerk also reported that the Town Council at its Annual Meeting on the 23rd instant, appointed the following as its representatives on the Commons Conservators until the Annual Meeting of the Council in 1950:—

His Worship the Mayor (Councillor Miss Wells).

Aldermen Allan and Raiswell.

Councillor Sheppard.

- Mr. S. V. Thorpe extended a welcome, on behalf of the Conservators, to His Worship the Mayor.
- Minutes.—The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.
- Accounts for Payment.—Accounts amounting to £664. 14s. 2d. (all as per list signed by the Chairman) were passed for payment.
- Employees.—The Surveyor reported that Mr. W. Lambkin, foreman in charge of employees engaged on work on the Commons, had been absent from duty owing to illness since 16th September last and had now produced a medical certificate as to his permanent incapacity for work.

RESOLVED—That Mr. A. W. Smith, acting foreman, be appointed foreman in charge of employees on the Commons in the place of Mr. Lambkin, at his present rate of pay, viz., £5. 0s. 8d. per week.

Questions relating to the desirability of taking steps to secure the admission of employees on the Commons into the superannuation scheme established by the Town Council under the provisions of the Local Government Superannuation Act, 1937, were considered.

RESOLVED-That no action be taken in the matter.

- Appointment of Committee.—Resolved—That the Mayor (Councillor Miss Wells) and Messrs. R. S. R. Berry, R. W. Card, W. S. Hallett-Reed, F. F. Howarth and W. C. Raiswell be appointed a Committee for the ensuing year to report to the Conservators on such matters as may be referred to them from time to time and that three members do form a quorum of the Committee.
- Appointment of Auditors.—Resolved—That a vote of thanks be given to the Auditors, Messrs. F. F. Howarth and W. C. Raiswell, for their services and that they be re-appointed Auditors to audit the accounts for the past financial year.
- Accounts—Year ended 31st March, 1949.—The Treasurer submitted the Accounts of the Commons Conservators for the year ended 31st March, 1949.

RESOLVED—That, subject to audit, the accounts be approved.

Clearance of Commons.—The Clerk reported that he had received three anonymous complaints (two of which had been addressed to the local branch of the R.S.P.C.A.) with regard to the extent of the clearance work now being carried out on the Rusthall Common, the grounds for complaint in each case being that nesting places for birds were being disturbed.

The Surveyor reported in connection with the matter that the clearing of the undergrowth was commenced before the nesting season and very few birds' nests had been found, and that when they had been found the shrub or bush containing them had been left undisturbed.

The Surveyor also reported—

- (1) That a considerable amount of common land previously an impenetrable mass of brambles and blackthorn had now been made available to the public and large quantities of broken bottles, tin cans and other debris had been removed.
- (2) That the clearance work would shortly be closed down owing to the need to transfer employees to grass cutting and repairs to paths, but that it was proposed to re-commence clearing as soon as the employees were again available for the work.
- (3) That the spread of bracken on both Commons was gradually reducing the area of turf and that it was impossible to deal with this problem with the labour available.
- Rabbit Snating.—The Clerk submitted an application he had received for permission to snare rabbits on the Commons.

RESOLVED—That the applicant be informed that his request should be addressed to the Manorial Authorities.

Litter Baskets.—The Clerk reported that he had received a request from Mrs. Gaitskell-Burr that additional litter baskets should be provided on the Commons.

The Surveyor reported that he estimated the cost of wire litter baskets at £3. 10s. 0d. each.

RESOLVED—That Mrs. Gaitskell-Burr be informed that in the opinion of the Conservators the provision of additional litter baskets would not reduce to any appreciable extent the amount of litter scattered on the Commons by members of the public, and that they regret, therefore, that they are unable to comply with her suggestion.

- Rusthall Common.—The Clerk reported that on the 17th instant he received a report from the Kent County Constabulary that a hole in the earth on Rusthall Common had been discovered by the employees engaged on the clearance of undergrowth, approximately 150 yards from Bretland Road, that the hole was thought to have been caused by an unexploded bomb in view of the fact that six such bombs fell in the immediate vicinity in October, 1940, and that "Unexploded Bomb" notices had accordingly been posted on the site and the appropriate authorities notified.
- Higher Cricket Ground.—The Clerk reported that he had received a Police Report on the playing of unauthorised games on the Higher Cricket Ground on the 1st instant in contravention of the Conservators' Bye-laws.

RESOLVED—That in this instance proceedings be not taken against the offenders but that the Clerk be instructed to warn them against a repetition of the occurrence.

Lower Cricket Ground.—The Surveyor reported that work had commenced on restoring the grass on the track made by the public across the Lower Cricket Ground and would be completed now that the ground was no longer required for football.

It was reported to the Conservators that while the track in question had been closed to the public another track was being formed.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Committee to report to the Conservators on the best means of fencing off the Lower Cricket Ground in such a manner as to prevent the formation of further tracks.

Tunbridge Wells Common.—A letter was received from Mr. S. H. Muffett calling attention to the following matters requiring attention on the Tunbridge Wells Common:

- (1) The surface condition of a certain part of the Old Race Course in which dangerous ruts had been formed.
- (2) A seat on the same pathway, south of Major Yorke's Road, requiring repair.
- (3) The poor condition of a soil path at a point where a path from the Queen's Grove to the Post Office verges on to Castle Road, owing to erosion by surface water.

RESOLVED—That the matters be referred to the Surveyor for consideration and report.

4th October, 1949.—At a meeting of the Commons Conservators held at the Town Hall.

PRESENT—The Mayor (Councillor Miss Wells) (Chairman).

Messrs. T. C. Allan, R. S. R. Berry, R. W. Card, W. S. Hallett-Reed, F. F. Howarth, G. F. Morrell, H. A. Sheppard, C. H. Strange and S. V. Thorpe.

Minutes.—The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

Accounts for Payment.—Accounts amounting to £501. 2s. 7d. (all as per list signed by the Chairman) were passed for payment.

Appointment of Conservators.—A letter was received from the Secretary to the Freehold Tenants notifying the appointment of the following representatives on the Commons Conservators until the Annual Meeting of the Town Council in 1952:—

Messrs. R. Gunnis, W. S. Hallett-Reed, F. F. Howarth and G. F. Morrell.

Committee's Report.—The following minutes of the proceedings of the Committee at its meeting on the 22nd June, 1949, were submitted to the Conservators for approval.

22nd June, 1949.—At a meeting of the Committee of the Commons Conservators held on the Tunbridge Wells Common.

PRESENT—The Mayor (Councillor Miss Wells) (Chairman).

Messrs. R. S. R. Berry, R. W. Card, W. S. Hallett-Reed and W. C. Raiswell.

1—Lower Cricket Ground.—The Committee considered various methods of preventing the formation of tracks across the Lower Cricket Ground by members of the public.

The Surveyor reported that the necessary material to enable railings to be re-affixed for distances of 80 yards at each end of the existing track across the ground had now been delivered and would shortly be erected.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to proceed with the provision of the railings for which provision has been made in the current year's estimates and also to erect notices requesting the public to keep to the footpaths.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed also to explore the possibility of obtaining a supply of Dannert (barbed) wire to be placed around the football pitch on this ground while works of restoration are in progress.

2—Higher Cricket Ground.—The Committee also considered complaints received with regard to the playing of unauthorised games on the Higher Cricket Ground.

RESOLVED—That the Clerk be instructed to confer with the Police Authority with a view to action being taken to enforce the Bye-law prohibiting the playing of unauthorised games on parts of the Commons set apart for cricket.

3—Litter on Commons.—The Committee considered a complaint received as to the amount of litter left lying on the Commons.

RESOLVED—That no action be taken in the matter.

RESOLVED—That the foregoing minutes be approved.

Tunbridge Wells Common.—The attention of the Conservators was called to the danger to children playing in the vicinity of the Wellington Rocks owing to the presence of broken glass, and also to the defacement of the Rocks.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Surveyor.

A letter was received from Miss E. B. Roome calling attention to the damage being caused to a large tree on the Tunbridge Wells Common, by the growth thereon of ivy.

The Surveyor reported that this matter had now received attention.

The attention of the Conservators was called to the need to cut back gorse bushes overhanging the private road to Mount Edgcumbe.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Surveyor.

- Higher Cricket Ground.—A letter was received from the Linden Park Cricket Club calling attention to the damage caused to the Higher Cricket Ground by the playing thereon of unauthorised games, and suggesting the erection of notice boards drawing attention to the prohibition against such games.
 - The Clerk reported that in accordance with the instructions of the Committee he had communicated with the Police Authority with a view to action being taken to enforce the Bye-law dealing with this matter, and submitted a letter from the Superintendent of Police stating that instructions had been given to Police Officers to pay particular attention to the enforcement of the Bye-law, but pointing out that on the last occasion a report was submitted by the Police on this subject, the Conservators decided not to take proceedings against the offenders.

RESOLVED—That, in the event of a report being received from the Police Authority in future of an infringement of the Conservator's Bye-laws, the matter be referred to the Committee with power, if sufficient evidence is available, to authorise proceedings to be taken against the offenders.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to obtain estimates of the cost of purchasing sufficient second-hand railings completely to enclose the Higher Cricket Ground, and that such tenders be referred to the Committee with power (i) to accept the most favourable, and (ii) to make application to the Finance Committee of the Town Council for a supplementary grant to enable this work to be proceeded with during the current financial year.

- Brighton Lake.—The Clerk submitted a number of letters received by the Mayor from residents in the Borough, suggesting that the Brighton Lake should be put into a fit condition to enable it to be used as a Model Yacht Pond.
 - A letter was also received from the Tunbridge Wells Industrial Council suggesting the erection of warning notices at the Brighton Lake, drawing attention to the dangers of paddling therein owing to the presence of broken glass.

RESOLVED—That no action be taken on the foregoing matters.

Rusthall Common.—A letter was received from Miss E. Waddilove calling attention to damage to benches and seats on the Rusthall Common caused by irresponsible persons.

RESOLVED—That Miss Waddilove be informed of the action the Conservators propose to take in this matter.

- A letter was received from the County Civil Defence Officer, stating that the suspected unexploded bomb on the Rusthall Common, referred to in the Conservators' minutes of 31st May last, had now been investigated and discredited.
- Bracken.—The Surveyor submitted a letter from Mr. L. Alexander requesting permission to cut bracken on the Commons for the purpose of bedding down horses.

RESOLVED—That the applicant be referred to the Manorial Authorities.

Cycling on Footpaths.—It was reported to the Conservators that the practise of cycling on footpaths on the Commons was becoming more prevalent and that the Commons Ranger had suggested that the erection of notices calling attention to the fact that this was prohibited might act as a deterrent.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to erect notices calling attention to the prohibition against cycling on footpaths on the Commons, at each end of the main paths across the Commons.

Employees.—Questions relating to the absence from duty, owing to a disability, of an employee of the Conservators were considered.

It was reported that to date the Conservators had adopted no scheme for the payment of wages to its employees during periods of sickness or disability.

RESOLVED—That, subject to the production of regular medical evidence of his incapacity, the employee in question be paid his normal weekly wage, less the amount of any sickness benefit to which he is entitled under the National Insurance Act, 1946, during the period of his incapacity, up to a maximum of 13 weeks.

RESOLVED—That the Conservators do adopt a scheme enabling its employees absent from duty owing to sickness, accident or disablement, not arising from or attributable to their own misconduct, to receive, subject to the submission of satisfactory medical evidence, an amount equivalent to their normal weekly wage, exclusive of overtime or other occasional or exceptional payments, for the following periods, according to length of service:—

- (a) after six months but less than twelve months continuous service—six weeks
- (b) after twelve months continuous service—thirteen weeks,

the amount of sickness benefit or compensation receivable under any statutory provisions to be deducted from their wages.

RESOLVED—That the Clerk be instructed to draw up for the consideration of the Committee of the Conservators a scheme embodying the above provisions.

Audit of Accounts.—The Treasurer reported that the Audit of the Conservators' Accounts for the year ended 31st March, 1949, had now been completed.

SICKNESS PAY SCHEME.

- ALIFICATION R BENEFITS
- 1. Before becoming entitled to benefit under this scheme an employee shall :-
 - (a) complete six menths! continuous service, and
 - (b) submit (if so required) to a medical examination by a registered medical practitioner nominated by the Conservators and be recommended by such medical practitioner for admission to the scheme.

CKNESS LOWANCE 2. An omployed to whom this scheme applies shall, within any poriod of twlove consecutive calendar menths, be granted during absonce due to sickness, accident or disablement, not arising from or attributable to the employee's own miscenduct, an allowance which when added to:

(i) The rates of sickness benefit receivable under the National Insurance Act, 1946,

(ii) the rates of injury benefit receivable under the National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) Act 1946.

(iii) componsation payments under the Workmon's Componsation Acts where the right to componsation arises in respect of an accident sustained before 5th July, 1948.

(iv) componsation payments under the Employers' Liability Acts or at Common Law. will secure to the employee the equivalent of the normal weekly wage, exclusive of evertime or other occasional or exceptional payments for the following periods according to length of service:

(a) after six menths but less than twelve menths continuous service - six wooks,

(b) after two lve menths continuous service - thirteen weeks,

provided that
(a) the employee for the purposes of the scheme, shall be under an obligation to declare to the Conservators in whatseever manner may be required his or her entitlement to benefit under the foregoing Acts, and any subsequent alteration in the circumstances on which such entitlement is based, in default of which the Conservators shall be entitled to determine the benefit by reference to the maximum benefit obtainable and

(b) The Consorvators may, at their discretion extend the period fo sickness allowance in individual cases if the circumstances so justify.

LCULATION PERIOD OF LOWANCE 3. The period during which the sickness allowance shall be paid in respect of any period of absence due to sickness, accident or disablement, shall be ascertained by deducting from the period of benefit on the first day of absence, the aggregate of the periods of absence dur to sickness, during the year immediately preceding the first day of absence provided that -

(a) a period of absence due to an injury sustained by an employee in the discharge of his duty and without his own default, shall not be taken into account for the purposes of this scheme and

(b) a period of absence due to an injury sustained by an employee in which he recovers damage from a third party shall be treated in the terms of paragraph 5 of this scheme.

LUSION BENEFIT An employee whose absence on account of sickness is due or attributable to his or her own misconduct, or to active participation in sport as a professional, shall not be entitled to a sickness allowance except at the discretion of the Conservators.

IDENT -RD PARTY IMS 5.

An employee who is absent as a result of an accident shall not be entitled to an allowance if damages are recoverable from a third party. In this event the Conservators may, having regard to the circumstances of the case, advance to the employee a sum not exceeding the sickness allowance provided under this scheme, subject to the employee undertaking to refund to them the total amount of such allowance, or the proportion thereof represented in the amount of damages received. Any period of absence in such a case where a refund of the monies advanced is made in full shall not be taken into account for the purposes of paragraph three of this scheme. Where, however, the refund is made in part only, the Conservators may at their discretion decide to what extent, if any, the period of absence may be taken into account for the purposes of paragraph three.

TIFICATION 6.

An employee shall not be entitled to claim an allowance unless

(a) notification is made immediately to the Surveyor to the Conservators, and

(b) the sickness is certified by a registered medical practitioner and a certificate furnished to the conservators not later than the fourth day of absence and at such other times during the period of sickness

as they may reasonably require.
An employee shall if required by the
Conservators at any time during any period of
absence due to sickness, submit to a medical
examination by a registered medical
practitioner nominated by the Conservators and
in case of dispute as to the source and nature
of the sickness of the employee the matter
shall be referred to the local appeal tribunal
established under the National Insurance
(Industrial Injuries) Act, 1946.

Any parment under this scheme shall not be an admission of liability under the Workmen's Compensation Acts, the Employers' Liability Acts, any Acts amending, altering or affecting those Acts, or at Common Law.

- Tunbridge Wells Common—Seats.—A letter was received from the Tunbridge Wells Civic Association calling attention to the advanced state of dilapidation into which many of the seats on the Tunbridge Wells Common had fallen, and suggesting that action should be taken to examine these seats and to carry out the necessary repairs.
 - The Surveyor reported that he hoped shortly to obtain delivery of six new seats for the Common at an estimated cost of £60 and that the remainder of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates for the provision of seats would be expended on the repair of those found to be damaged.

RESOLVED—That the Civic Association be informed accordingly.

Brighton Lake.—A letter was received from the Tunbridge Wells Industrial Council with regard to its suggestion that notices should be erected in the vicinity of the Brighton Lake warning the public against the danger of paddling in the Lake owing to the presence of broken glass, requesting the Conservators to reconsider their decision not to take action in this matter.

RESOLVED—That the Industrial Council be informed that the Conservators are unable to see their way to depart from their previous decision.

- Higher Cricket Ground.—A letter was received from the Linden Park Cricket Club thanking the Conservators for the action which they proposed to take to prevent, so far as possible, the playing of unauthorised games on the Higher Cricket Ground and for the enclosure of the ground.
- Rusthall Common.—A letter was received from the Rusthall Cricket Club calling attention to the deterioration of the cricket ground on the Rusthall Common owing to its use by the public for the playing of unauthorised games, and indicating steps which it proposed to take to prevent, so far as possible, this practice; further stating, however, that in its opinion the only adequate solution of this problem would be the provision of a suitable recreation ground for children, and suggesting for the consideration of the Conservators, the setting apart of an area of land in the vicinity of Common View for this purpose.

RESOLVED—That the Rusthall Cricket Club be informed that the Conservators regret that they are unable to assist in the manner it suggests.

RESOLVED—That application be made to the Finance Committee of the Town Council for a supplementary grant of £45 to enable this work to be put in hand during the current financial year and that, subject to the grant being forthcoming, the Surveyor be authorised to proceed with the work.

Employees.—In accordance with the instructions of the Conservators at their last meeting, the Clerk submitted to the Committee a draft scheme authorising payment of wages to employees of the Conservators during periods of sickness or disability.

RESOLVED—That the Conservators be recommended to adopt the Scheme, as now amended by the Committee, with effect as from the 1st November, 1949.

RESOLVED—That the foregoing minutes be approved and that the recommendation contained therein be adopted and acted upon.

The Clerk reported that following the meeting of the Committee application had been made to the Finance Committee of the Town Council for a supplementary grant of £45 to enable the Conservators to complete, during the current financial year, the erection of posts and railings around the Higher Cricket Ground and that the Finance Committee, while not prepared to agree to the making of supplementary grant, had indicated that no objection would be raised to the expenditure being met out of the Conservators' general Estimates during the current year, provided that the total amount of those Estimates was not exceeded.

RESOLVED—That the quotation of the Ocean Accident and Guarantee Corporation, Ltd., to effect the necessary cover for a premium of 2s. per cent., of the annual amount of salaries and wages paid to Officers and Employees of the Conservators, less 10 per cent., be accepted for a period of one year from the 1st April, 1950.

- Trees.—The Conservators again considered the letter from Mr. E. C. G. Newton, suggesting the lopping of two lime trees outside No. 24, Eridge Road.
 - RESOLVED—That no action be taken in the matter.
- Paths.—It was reported that the Manorial authorities had now dealt with the question of the repairs carried out by the Rev. R. R. Needham to a track leading from Mount Ephraim to Gibraltar Cottage.
- Encroachments.—It was reported that the Manorial authorities had been in communication with the owner of No. 77, London Road, on the subject of vehicular access to those premises across the Common from London Road.

 - The Surveyor informed the Conservators of the difficulty of carrying out this work by direct labour owing to labour shortages and recommended that consideration be given to the desirability of entrusting the work to a local contractor.

RESOLVED—That the matter be referred to the Surveyor to make the best possible arrangements.

Tunbridge Wells Common.—A further letter was received from Mrs. A. R. Bacon, with reference to her suggestion that bushes and undergrowth on that portion of the Common lying between the road from the Spa Hotel to Hurstwood Lane and Mount Ephraim should be cleared to enable advantage to be gained from the lights on Mount Ephraim.

RESOLVED—That Mrs. Bacon be informed that the public lighting on Mount Ephraim is arranged in such a manner that even if the bushes to which she refers were cleared, no advantage would be gained therefrom, but that such clearance of dead bushes as may be necessary will be effected in due course.

Bye-law Infringements—(1) Encroachments.—A letter was received from Mr. C. H. Stanley, calling attention to the practice of motorists of parking their cars on the Tunbridge Wells Common, off Castle Road, in the vicinity of the Lower Cricket Ground, and suggesting that a post be erected in the centre of the entrance to the footpath used by motorists for the purpose of gaining access to the Common, or alternatively that a warning notice should be erected.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be instructed to arrange for the erection of a post on the footpath in question.

The Conservators also considered a report by the Common Ranger on the use by motorists of the footpath crossing the Common, known as the Old Race Course and suggesting that posts which previously existed at the entrance to this footpath from Hungershall Park, should be reinstated.

- 3—Flying of Model Aircraft on the Commons.—With regard to paragraph 3 of the Minutes of the meeting of the Conservators held on 30th September, 1952, the Clerk submitted a letter from the Home Office, asking the Conservators to reconsider the possibility of setting aside a suitable portion of the Commons for flying model aircraft, if necessary with some restriction on the times when flying is permitted, and also asking for the views of the local model aircraft clubs on the Conservators' proposal to prohibit flying on any part of the Commons. The Clerk reported that he had consulted both the Linden Park Cricket Club and the Model Aero Club; the former stated that the flying of model aircraft on their ground was completely unauthorised and the latter that none of their members used the Commons for flying and that it would not affect them in any way if flying were prohibited.

RESOLVED—That the Clerk be instructed to approach the Home Office again giving the views of the Model Aero Club, and in the light of the Club's reply, pressing the Secretary of State to confirm the byelaw as originally submitted.

4—Vehicles on Footpaths.—An application was submitted from a Mrs. Figg, for permission to drive her electric invalid's chair on the footpath from Hungershall Park to Major York's Road, near York Cottage.

RESOLVED—That Mrs. Figg be informed the Conservators very much regret they are unable to accede to her request as vehicles are prohibited by their Byelaws from being driven on any paths on the Commons.

5—Maintenance of the Commons.—With reference to paragraph 8 of the Minutes of the Conservators' meeting held on 30th December last, the Clerk reported that owing to the continued ill health of Mr. J. W. Mercer, the Sub-Committee appointed to consider this matter had not yet met.

RESOLVED—That the Clerk be instructed to write to Mr. Mercer sending the sympathy of the Conservators and expressing the hope that he will soon recover his health.

6—Clearance of Undergrowth.—The Surveyor reported that Mr. Murphy, of 1a, Nevill Park, had asked that the undergrowth should be cleared on that part of the Common adjoining Nevill Park in the same way as that fronting Bishop's Down.

RESOLVED—That Mr. Murphy be informed that the Conservators are unable to accede to his request and that the Common at Rusthall on the south side of the Langton Road be cleared in due course.

7—Employees—Protective Clothing.—The Surveyor reported that, at the present time workmen employed on the Commons had to stop work in wet weather as they had no waterproof clothing.

RESOLVED—That the Surveyor be authorised to purchase waterproof jackets at £2 8s. 0d. each for the use of the Conservators' employees.

The Surveyor reported on possible economies which might be effected by reducing the number of the permanent staff of workmen and contracting with the Corporation for the supply of labour necessary to clear the undergrowth.

RESOLVED—That, for a period of 12 months the number of workmen permanently engaged by the Conservators be fixed at four and, that workmen be engaged through the Tunbridge Wells Corporation for clearing undergrowth.

10—Flying of Model Aircraft on the Commons.—The Clerk submitted a letter from the Under Secretary of State intimating that, subject to the consideration of any objections which he might receive, he would be prepared to confirm Byelaws in the terms of a draft then submitted to the Conservators.

RESOLVED-

- (1) That the Conservators do frame the following Byelaws:—
 - 1. Throughout these Byelaws the expression "the Conservators" means the Conservators nominated and appointed for the time being under the provisions of Section 152 of the Tunbridge Wells Improvement Act, 1890; the expression "the Commons" means the Commons as defined by Section 151 of the said Act and the expression "power-driven model aircraft" means any model aircraft driven by the combustion of petrol-vapour or other combustible sustances.
 - 2. A person shall not fly any power-driven model aircraft on the Commons.
 - 3. Every person who shall offend against the foregoing Byelaw shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding two pounds.
- (2) That the Byelaws be signed by three Conservators and the Clerk.
- (3) That the Clerk be instructed to take the necessary steps to advertise the Byelaws and to submit them to the Home Secretary for confirmation.
- 11—Footpaths and Seats.—The Conservators considered a letter from Miss Wylde, of 55, Mount Ephraim, suggesting that certain tracks on the Common should be made up with asphalt, and asking that two covered seats be provided.
 - The Surveyor reported that none of the tracks mentioned by Miss Wylde were repairable either by the Conservators or by the Tunbridge Wells Corporation.

RESOLVED-

- (1) That Miss Wylde be informed that the Conservators are unable to accede to her request with regard to the footpaths.
- (2) That the question of the provision of covered seats be considered by the Committee when they meet to discuss the disposal of the insurance money referred to in paragraph 8 of these Minutes, and that Miss Wylde be so informed.
- 12—Litter.—The Conservators considered a suggestion from Mr. J. Hudson, of 64, Dynevor Road, that picture slogans be erected at refuse containers to be erected on various points on the Commons.

RESOLVED—That the suggestion be not adopted.

13—Grass Cutting.—The Surveyor reported that he had received a letter from Mr. F. Lawson Dodd, of 2, Howrah House, 76, London Road, thanking the Conservators for the improvement to London Road by the cutting of the rough grass opposite the houses on the south-east side of the road, and suggesting that still more benefit to the turf could be achieved if it were run over by a light mechanical roller to flatten the lumps.

RESOLVED—That Mr. Lawson Dodd's suggestion be not adopted.

14—Rusthall Common—Tethering of Horses.—Mr. Thorpe reported complaints which had been received through the Secretary of the Freehold Tenants with regard to the tethering of two horses on the Common at Rusthall.

RESOLVED—That the Clerk be instructed to inform the Secretary of the Freehold Tenants that the grazing of horses on the Common appears to be an infringement of the rights of the Freehold Tenants, who should take appropriate action to prevent this trespass.
