Dear Neighbours,

At last there are signs of Spring on the Commons and the sun is making an appearance. Here are your updates from the Commons for February...

- February started with a flurry of activity as our contractors helped kick off a number of the Freehold Tenant and S106 funded projects. All of the projects had roughly the same aims, to remove and coppice the poor quality regenerative growth of holly, sycamore and birch that has been allowed to grow quite out of control over the last 20-30 years. Removal of the trees will bring a variety of benefits such as restoration of vistas, revealing significant trees giving them a better chance of reaching veteran status, encouraging the herb/grass species to grow, providing better habitat and foraging areas for insects, birds, bats etc enhancing biodiversity. We are delighted with the work that has been completed....have you managed to spot where we've been busy?
- The date for the Friends of the Commons' funded free forest school on Rusthall Common has now been confirmed as Thursday 10th April. We are delighted to welcome back Kent HIgh Weald Partnership who will be running all of the activities. Do pop along with your little people and join the fun. - I was invited to St Paul's Primary School on 26th February to participate in their Year 4, 5 & 6 COP 25 activities, raising awareness of our environmental impacts and discussing how to better look after the planet by considering our carbon footprint, how to enhance biodiversity and how to campaign and get our voices heard.
